A Courier Istely dispatched hither from Monsieur du Paf-128, Li.utenant General of His Majesties forces in Roufillon, has informed His Majesty, that the Spaniards had drawn together a confiderable body of their forces in Catalonia, but with what defign he yet know not; defiring His Majesty to order more forces to be sent him for the security of the frontiers, in case any thing should be attempted in prejudice of the late peace.
