

Brandyke Broad, in the parish of Burgh St. Margaret, and Muckfleet Dyke, and the marshes and low-lying lands and pastures near or adjacent thereto respectively.

(e.) The whole of the foreshore of the County of Norfolk, including the shingle, sand hills, salt marshes, creeks, and other unenclosed lands extending from high-water mark to the first boundary of enclosed or cultivated land separating the foreshore from them.

Certain Eggs Protected throughout the County.

VII. The taking or destroying of the eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County of Norfolk, viz.:—1. Great Bustard (*Otis tarda*). 2. Bearded Titmouse or Reed Pheasant (*Panurus biarmicus*). 3. Crossbill (*Loxia curvirostris*). 4. Owls—all species. 5. Wild Ducks and Teal—all species. 6. Norfolk Plover, Stone Curlew or Thickknee (*Edicnemus scolopax*). 7. Rough or Reeve (*Machetes pugnax*). 8. Ring Dotterel, Ring Plover, or Stone Runner (*Ægialitis hiaticula*). 9. Oyster Catcher or Sea Pie (*Hematopus ostralegus*). 10. Terns, Sea Swallows, Pearls or Dip Ears, (*Sterna*)—all species. 11. Great Crested Grebe or Loon (*Podiceps cristatus*). 12. Kingfisher (*Alcedo ispida*). 13. Sandmartin (*Cotyle riparia*).

Repeal of former Order.

VIII. The Order of the 9th April, 1900, is hereby repealed.

WILD BIRD (ENGLAND).

The Wild Birds Protection (City of Norwich) Order, 1901.

Dated 4th April, 1901.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1896, and upon application by the Council of the City of Norwich, I hereby make the following Order:—

Title.

1. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (City of Norwich) Order, 1901."

BIRDS.

Addition to Schedule of Act of 1880.

II. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the County of the City of Norwich (namely without the walls and within the areas described in Clause IV of this Order) to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the schedule to the Act:—Bearded Titmouse or Reed Pheasant, Crossbill, Sandmartin.

Close Time extended.

III. The period during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Act of 1880 shall be extended throughout the County of the City of Norwich (namely, without the walls and within the areas described in Clause IV of this Order), so far as regards all Birds mentioned in the schedule to that Act, except the Snipe, Teal, and all species of Wild Duck, so as to be between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of September in any year.

The Great Bustard Protected during the whole of the Year.

During the period between the 31st day of August in any year and the 2nd day of March following the killing or taking of the Great Bustard is prohibited throughout the City of Norwich and County of the same City and within the areas described in Clause IV of this Order.

All Birds Protected on Sundays in certain Areas.

IV. During the period between the 31st day of August in any year and the 2nd day of March following, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited within the County of the City of Norwich, namely, the parts without the walls, and the parts of the Rivers Yare or Wensum within the County of the said City, from the boundary of the County of the said City at Hellesdon, in the County of Norfolk, to Hardley Cross, at Hardley, in the County of Norfolk, and from Trowse Hythe to, at, or near, Earlham Bridge, and the rands, skirts, and walls of all the before-mentioned rivers, and the fens, reed grounds, islands therein, and dykes within the said County communicating therewith.

EGGS.

All Eggs Protected in certain Areas.

V. The taking or destroying of the eggs of any species of Wild Birds—except the House Sparrow and the Tree Sparrow—is prohibited during the period expiring on the last day of February, 1906, within the areas described in Clause IV of this Order.
