"The Locomotives Act, 1898."

Bye-laws with respect to Locomotives in the county of Hertford.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the County Council for the Administrative County of Hertford have, under the powers conferred upon them by section 6 of "The Locomotives Act, 1898," at a Meeting held at the Court House, St. Albans, in the said county, on the 6th day of May, 1901, made and sealed Bye-laws regulating the use of locomotives and waggon drawn by locomotives on any highway in the administrative county of Hertford.

And notice is hereby also given, that it is the intention of the said County Council to apply to the Local Government Board at the expiration of one month from the 15th day of May, 1901, for confirmation of the said Bye-laws, and that a copy of the said Bye-laws is kept at the offices of the Clerk of the said County Council at Hertford and St. Albans, and is open to the inspection of the inhabitants of the said county without fee or reward, on every day except Sundays and Thursdays, between the hours of 10 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon, and on Thursdays between the hours of 10 o'clock in the forenoon and 1 o'clock in the afternoon. And the Clerk of the said County Council will on the application of any such inhabitant furnish him with a copy of such proposed Bye-laws or any part thereof on payment of sixpence for every hundred words contained in such copy.
