NOTICES TO MARINERS.

(Nos. 474 to 490 of the year 1901.)

[The bearings are magnetic, and those concerning the visibility of lights are given from seaward.]

No. 474.—BALTIC—KIEL FIORD APPROACH.

Stollergrund Light-Vessel—Temporary Withdrawal for Repairs.

THE German Government has given notice that during July, 1901, the Stollergrund Light-vessel (exhibiting a white group flashing light), Kiel Fiord Approach, will temporarily be replaced by the Stollergrund Reserve Light-vessel exhibiting a red fixed light, visible from a distance of 7 miles.

During thick or foggy weather a bell will be rung every two minutes, giving several strokes separated by short intervals, followed by strokes separated by longer intervals.

Vessels standing into danger will be warned by the firing two guns in succession every three minutes, by the ringing a bell, and by displaying the usual international code signals.

Approximate position, lat. 54° 30' N., long. 10° 17' E.
