THE Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for the Colonies, the following Quarantine Notices from the Cyprus Gazette:— (No. 5672.)

Under the power and authority vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner directs that the quarantine imposed on arrivals of pilgrims from Hejaz, Yambo, and Lith be abolished.

2nd July, 1901.

(No. 5682.)

Under the power and authority vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner orders that all direct arrivals from Constantinople be subjected to five days' quarantine with general disinfection to be undergone at Larnaca.

4th July, 1901.

(No. 5683.)

Under the power and authority vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner is pleased to direct that all arrivals in Cyprus from Beyrout having on board Egyptian passengers, passengers' effects or goods for Cyprus reasonably supposed to have come from Egypt will be admitted to pratique at Larnaca only after such disinfection as may be considered necessary by the Chief Medical Officer and after undergoing the period of quarantine required to carry out such disinfection.

9th July, 1901.

(No. 5684.)

Under the power and authority vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner orders that all direct arrivals from Scio be subjected to five days' quarantine to be undergone at Larnaca, and that the importation of very susceptible goods, i.e., rags, worn clothing and empty used sacks, except gypsum sacks, is prohibited.

15th July, 1901.

(No. 5685.)

Under the power and authority vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," His Excellency the High Commissioner directs that from this date and until further notice the importation of all very susceptible goods of Egyptian origin, i.e., rags, worn clothing and empty used sacks, except gypsum sacks, shall be prohibited.

10th July, 1901
