

were purposes for which money may be borrowed under sub-section (2) of section 46 of the Act.

(6.)—(a.) The local authority may, for the purposes of defraying the expenses, or any part thereof, incurred or to be incurred by them of and incidental to the Schemes and of carrying into effect the Schemes, including the provisions of this Article, for the dwelling accommodation of persons of the working class displaced by the Schemes, borrow such sum or sums of money as they may from time to time require, and as regards the borrowing by the local authority of any such sum or sums and the repayment thereof the provisions of sections 183 to 191 of the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, as applied by sub-section (2) of section 46 of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, shall apply as if the said purposes were purposes for which money may be borrowed under that sub-section.

(b.) The London County Council may, for the purpose of paying or contributing any sum which they may agree to pay or contribute, or which they may be ordered by a Secretary of State, pursuant to sub-section (7) of section 46 of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, to pay or contribute towards the expenses of the local authority of carrying into effect the Schemes, including the provisions of this Article, for the dwelling accommodation of persons of the working class displaced by the Schemes, borrow under, and subject to, the provisions

of the Acts for the time being, regulating the raising of money by the Council for capital purposes, such sum or sums of money as they may from time to time require.

(7.) Such of the lands in the areas comprised in the schemes as shall not be required for the purposes of providing accommodation for persons of the working class, as aforesaid, shall be dedicated as a highway or open space unless we shall otherwise direct.

ART. II. We order that the provisions of the Lands Clauses Acts shall be incorporated with this Order so as to enable the local authority to acquire compulsorily lands within the areas comprised in the schemes.

* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the local inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure that officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
