

## REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

Order No. 24/1902.

NOTICE is hereby given, that in pursuance of the provisions of the twenty-first section of an Act passed in the thirty-eighth year of the reign of Her late Majesty, intituled "The Births and Deaths Registration Act, 1874," I, Reginald MacLeod, O.B., Registrar-General of Births, Deaths, and Marriages in England, have, with the sanction of the Local Government Board, ordered and declared that on and after the 1st day of April next, in consequence of the dissolution of Guiltcross Poor Law Union by Local Government Board Order No. 43337, dated 10th March, 1902, Guiltcross Registration District shall cease to be a separate Registration District, and its constituent Civil Parishes shall be dealt with in the following manner:—(1) Bressingham, Fersfield, Roydon, Shelfanger, and Winfarthing Civil Parishes, which by the said Order will be added to Depwade Poor Law Union, shall be transferred from Baham Sub-District of Guiltcross Registration District to Diss Sub-District of Depwade Registration District; (2) Blo'Norton, Bridgham, East Harling, Garboldisham, Gasthorpe, North Lopham, South Lopham, Riddlesworth, and West Harling Civil Parishes, which by the said Order will be added to Thetford Poor Law Union, shall be transferred from Kenninghall Sub-District of Guiltcross Registration District to Thetford Sub-District of Thetford Registration District; (3) Baham, New Buckenham, and Old Buckenham Civil Parishes, which by the said Order will be added to Wayland Poor Law Union, shall be transferred from Baham Sub-District of Guiltcross Registration District to Attleborough Sub-District of Wayland Registration District; and (4) Eccles, Kenninghall, Quidenham, and Wilby Civil Parishes, which will also be added to Wayland Poor Law Union, shall be transferred from Kenninghall Sub-District of Guiltcross Registration District to Attleborough Sub-District of Wayland Registration District.—Witness my hand this 24th day of March, 1902.

## LIGHT RAILWAYS ACT, 1896.

Vale of Rheidol Light Railway (Amendment)  
Order, 1902.
