A Railway No. 1. A Railway No. 2. Commencing in High-street, Slough, at a point opposite the north-west corner of the Crown Hotel by a junction with Railway No. 1, passing thence along the High-street, across the bridge carrying the road over the Great Western Railway (Windsor Branch), thence along the Bath-road, passing under the bridge carrying the Great Western Railway main line over that road, thence passing along the Bath-road across the bridge carrying the road over the River Thames, along Bridge-road, across the bridge carrying the road over the River Moor, along Bridge-street, and terminating at a point in the centre of High-street opposite to the south west corner of No. 16, Highstreet, Maidenhead.

Railway No. 2 will pass through or into the parishes of Slough, Stoke Poges, Farnham Royal, Burnham, Hitcham, Taplow, and Maiden-

head.

A Railway No. 3. Commencing in the village of Datchet in the centre of the road on the north side of the Datchet Cross, passing thence in an easterly direction through the village of Datchet, thence along Horton-road, Ditton-road, and London-road to the Bath-road, and terminating at a point in the centre of the Bath-road 17 yards measured in a south-westerly direction from the south-eastern corner of the William the Fourth Public-house by a junction with Railway No. 1.

Railway No. 3 will pass through or into the parishes of Datchet, Stoke Poges, and Horton.

A Railway No. 4. Commencing in the London-road by a junction with Railway No. 3 at a point in the London-road 34 yards measured in a south-westerly direction from the western corner of the William the Fourth Public-house, passing across the proposed Railway No. 1 along the road leading to Langley Station through the village of Horsemoor Green, and terminating at a point in the centre of the road opposite the southern boundary of the North Star Public-

Railway No. 4 will pass through or into the parishes of Stoke Poges (detached) and Langley

Marish.
