

Duke of Luxemburg's going thither, who is said to be discontinued at the Marquis de Bouffler's being made Colonel of the Regiment of French Guards. The two Companies of Musketeers, which are made up to 300 each, are to be divided into 4 Squadrons; whereof two are to go to the Army; and the other two to follow the Court. The Count d'Estree parted from hence the 23d of the last Month for London, to command the French Squad on in the Mediterranean. The French King came thither on the 26th past to put the Duke of Chartres in possession of the Palace Royal, and returned in the Evening to Versailles. The Abbot d'Estree prepares for his Embassy to Portugal.

Brussels, March 7. We have an account from Namur by Letters of the 1st Instant, that a great Convoy consisting of 7 Pieces of great Cannon, and above 200 Wagons laden with Provisions and Ammunition, was arrived there from Mastricht, having been conducted by Count Serclaes de Tilly, General of the Forces of Liege, with 3000 Horse and 1000 Foot as far as Burdine, and from thence to Namur by a strong Detachment commanded by the Count de Nassau Major General of the Dutch Troops, who commands those that are in that Garrison. On the 28th past a strong Party from Mons appeared near Grammont and Engkien, but they quickly retired again, having only taken 8 Horses, and plundered some Houses at Goycke. We hear from Mons, that they have there a great Train of Artillery ready to march, as it was designed for some Enterprize; and that a great quantity of Ammunition, Bombs, and Carcasses was brought thither from Valenciennes. We are preparing for the Reception of the Elector of Bavaria who is expected here about the middle of this month.

Edinburgh, Febr. 25. This Evening three Regiments of Foot, viz. the Earl of Leven's, Colonel Lowther's, and Colonel Beveridge's set sail for Flanders. The Earl of Argyle is expected here in order to embark about the middle of the next Month.

Newcastle, Febr. 26. On Friday last about 100 Sail of laden Colliers sailed out of Tinnmouth Haven with their Convoy; and this morning the remainder of the Fleet, being about 50 Sail, intended to sail likewise under the Convoy of the Sweepstakes.

Whitehaven, Febr. 21. This day arrived here part of Major General Ruyigny's Regiment of Horse from Ireland.

Chester, Febr. 25. Since my last Colonel Schecks Regiment of Horse, and Colonel Richman's Fusiliers, are landed here from Ireland.

Falmouth, Febr. 25. Yesterday in the Evening came before this Harbour Their Majesty's Ship the *Chester* and about 25 Sail of Transport Ships with Danish Soldiers from Ireland, and the Wind coming N. W. they are now going to Sea again. The Spanish Expedition sailed yesterday for the *Grays*, having on Board the Baron de Boingarden Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of Bavaria.

Piimonth, Febr. 26. On Wednesday last arrived here Their Majesties Ships the *Saphire* and *Chatham* from Bilbao; where they left the *Pearl* Frigate with the Merchant Ships that went out under their Convoy. Their Majesties Ships the *Monke* and the *Success* with the Merchant men that sailed hence with them, were put back yesterday by contrary Winds, but came not to an Anchor, for the Wind changing they sailed again in the same day to the Westward. The last night came in the *Chester* with the rest of the Dunes from Sicily.

Portsmouth, March 1. On Sunday last sailed from Spithead to the Eastward a Dutch Man of War, and 4 Dutch Capers, with several Prizes they have taken from the French. Their Majesty's Ships the *Staring-Castle* and the *Lenox* intend to set sail this day for the *Buoy of the Nore*.

Dunle, March 1. Their Majesty's Ships the *Mane* and the *Success* are come into the *Downes* with Colonel Earle's Regiment of Foot, and divers Merchantmen from Piimonth.

Whitehall, March 1. This day the Right Honourable Laurence Earl of Rochester, Richard Earl of Rineclagh, Charles Lord Cornwallis, and Sir Edward Seymour Bar. were Sworn of Their Majesties most Honourable Privy-Council, and accordingly took their places at the Board. And

The Right Honourable William Earl of Bedford took the usual Oaths as Lord Lieutenant of the County of Middlesex.

His Majesty has been pleased to Constitute the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Pembroke Lord Keeper of Their Majesties Privy Seal; which His Majesty delivered to his Lordship this day.

The Right Honourable Charles Lord Cornwallis is appointed by His Majesty to be Commissioner

of the Admiralty in the place of the Earl of Pembroke.

The Right Honourable Sir Edward Seymour Bar. and Charles Mountague Esq; are Constituted by His Majesty Commissioners of Their Majesty's Treasury in the places of Sir John Lowther of Lowther Bar. Vice Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, and Thomas Pelham Esq; who have resigned the same.
