Rome, March 8.

The French Cardinals *d'Estree* and *Fourbin* had on Wednesday last a long Conference with the Cardinals *Spada*, *Albani*, and *Panciatici*, about the Bulls that remain to be dispatched for the French Bishops; What they agreed upon we do not yet hear; but in the mean time 'tis observed that the Pope is very much inclined to put an end to this matter. As for the Bishops that have already obtained their Bulls, it has been proposed by the French, That seeing the Popes Nuncio at the Court of France is lately dead, the Archbishop of Paris, or some other Bishop of that Kingdom, may be appointed to give the Oath to the New Bishops, but the Pope does not like this; and intends to send another Nuncio forthwith thither. The Treasurer, and some other Officers of the Chamber are gone to *Civita Vecchia* to hasten out the Popes Gallies which are to joyn the Venetian Fleet this Summer in the Levant.

Vienna, March 20. The Preparations are continued here with great vigour for the next Campagne in Hungary, where the Emperor will have a very powerful Army. The Treaty is concluded with the Bishop of *Munster* for 4500 men; and we hope likewise to have 2000 from the King of Denmark; and 6000 from the Duke of Hanover, the Count de *Breiner* having been lately sent from hence to finish that Negotiation. Count *Wallstein* is come hither from *Munick*, with an account, That the Elector of Bavaria set forward towards the Low Countries the 15th instant, having appointed his Great Chamberlain Count *Paul de Fugger*, to be Governor of his Dominions during his absence. 'Tis confirmed by the last Letters from *Essex*, that our Troops have possessed themselves of a Pass near *Orsova*, by which they may cut off from *Belgrade* the Provisions that are usually sent thither by the Danube. The Turks continue to draw together in the Neighbourhood of that place, but we nor yet certainly learn either their number or Design. From *Upper Hungary* they write, That the Imperialists have repaired the Bridge on the River *Keres*, which makes the Communication between the Fort of *Obschi* and their other Posts before *Great Waradin*; And that the Turks in that Garison do suffer extremely, and would fain Capitulate, but their principal Officers will not consent to it, having positive Orders from the Grand Visier to hold out to the last Extremity.

Cologne, March 28. The Brandenburg Forces that have had their Winter Quarters in this Diocesis, begin to move towards the *Meuse*. We have an account by the last Letters from *Munster*, that upon the arrival there of the Count de *Rapach* from Vienna, Orders were given to draw Detachments out of their old Troops to form a Body of 4500 men, which that Bishop is to send to Hungary.

Hamburg, March 28. They write from Copenhagen, That the King of Denmark will send 2000 Men to the Emperor's Assistance in Hungary, under the Command of Colonel *Otto Rantzow*, and that these Troops are shortly to begin their march thither. We hear also from the Court of Hanover, that things are there in such a Disposition as give great hopes of the speedy Conclusion of the Treaty that's now on Foot between the Emperor and the Princes of *Luxemburg*; by which the latter are to assist his Imperial Majesty with 6000 Men.

Paris, March 28. The Troops who are to serve in Flanders, and have had their Winter Quarters in France, are ordered to march forthwith towards those Frontiers, where they are all to be by the 15th of the next Month. Several Detachments are sent to guard our Sea Coasts. The Officers of our Troops in Italy have Orders to repair thither with all diligence on pain of being cashiered.

The Letters from *Toulon* of the 15th instant say, That the Count *d'Estree* thought to set Sail from thence about the 20th of this Month, with the Squadron under his Command, which is to pass the *Streights*. The Envoy residing here from the Duke of Hanover says, he has Orders to return home. The French Kings Journey towards Flanders remains fixed for the latter end of the next Month; and we are assured, that the Court will pass in 2 or 3 months at *Valenciennes*. In the mean time the General Officers that are to Command our Forces this next Summer, are appointed as follows.

The Duke of *Luxemburg* to be General in Flanders; The Lieutenant Generals under him, are the Count *d'Auvergne*, (who Commands the Horse) the Prince de *Soubise*, the Duke de *Villeroi*, Monsieur *Rase*, the Duke of *Vendosme*, Monsieur de *Maulverier*, Monsieur de *Joyeuse*, the Count de *Montul*, the Duke de *Choiseul*, and the Marquis de *Lilladet*: The Mareschals de Camp are the Duke de *Bourbon*, the Prince de *Conti*, the Duke de *Maine*, (who is to Command the Foot) the Marquis de *Monreuil*, the Count de *Tiffy*, the Grand Prior, Monsieur de *Montchevreuil*, Monsieur de *Polasiron*, the Marquis de *Crequi*, the Prince d'*Elbeuf*, Monsieur de *Bujica* for the Troops of the Household.

The Duke de *Lorge* to Command the Army in Germany; Lieutenant Generals the Count de *Choiseul*, the Marquis de *Charnelli*, the Marquis d'*Uxelles*, Monsieur de *la Fosse*; Mareschals de Camp, Monsieur de *Bortillac*, Monsieur de *Coigre*, the Count de *Tallard*, Monsieur de *Feuquieres*, the Count de *Melac*, Monsieur de *la Brosse*.

The Duke de *Noailles*, General in *Catalonia*; under him, Lieutenant General de *Reuel*, Lieutenant General *Mazarin*; Mareschals de Camp, Monsieur de *Quiencan*, and the Marquis de *Longueval*.

Monsieur de *Catinat*, General in Italy; Lieutenant General, Monsieur de *Langallerie*; Mareschals de Camp, Monsieur de *Tessi*, Monsieur d'*Usson*, the Marquis de *St. Silvestre*.

The Marquis de *Boefflers* to Command between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*; Lieutenant General the Marquis de *Rubantel*; Mareschals de Camp, the Marquis de *Harcourt*, the Marquis de *Villers*, the Count de *Gasse*, and the Duke de *Roquelaure*.

The Mareschal de *Bellifond* is to Command a Body of 8 or 10000 Men on the Coasts of *Normandy*; And the Marquis de *Larre* another on the Coasts of *Gutonne*.

Brussels, March 30. The Elector of *Bavaria* does with great Application prepare Things for the approaching Campagne; He has caused a considerable number of Horses to be bought up for Remounting the Cavalry, and designs the Money, which the Towns present him with according to usual Custom, for that Use. On Thursday last his Electoral Highness took a Review of the Forces in Garison here, consisting in 10 Battalions, between 6 and 700 Men in each, and 32 Squadrons; which he found complete, and in very good Condition. 'Tis said that his Electoral Highness will go in few days to visit the Spanish Garisons in Flanders; and afterwards to meet the King at *Loo* or *Breda*, having in the mean time sent General *Steinau* to make his Compliment to His Majesty. The Count de *Berlo* is come hither from the Prince of *Liege*, to Congratulate his Electoral Highness upon his entering on this Government. The Elector of *Cologne* is expected here in a Fortnight. We hear from the Frontiers, That the French not being able to compleat their Recruits, have broke 38 Regiments of Horse, Foot, and Dragons, and made use of the Men to fill up other Regiments that wanted them.

Hague, April 1. The King came to Loo last Saturday Night; His Majesty before he went from hence Named Vice Admiral *Almonde* to be Lieutenant Admiral for the College of the Admiralty at *Amsterdam*, in the place of the Heer *Willem Bastiaens*, who is made Lieutenant Admiral of the *Meuse*; but the Command of Lieutenant Admiral General, which was lately possessed by the Heer *Van Tromp*, is not yet disposed of. The States of *Holland* are Adjourned till the 16th of this month. Lieutenant General *Overkerke* went hence last Night for *Flanders*; whither Prince *Waldecke* will follow towards the latter end of this Week. The Letters from *Geneva* tell us, That the French make use of all their Artifice to give that City a Jealousie of the Neighbourhood of the German Troops, and to persuade them to receive a Garison from the Catholick Canton of *Salve*, or *Friberg*, which the French King offers to pay, but that the Magistrates of *Geneva* had excused themselves from complying therewith, saying, They could do nothing of that kind without Advising with the Cantons of *Berne* and *Zuricke*. The same Letters say, That several French Troops that were ordered towards *Flanders* are countermanded and coming back towards *Savoy*.

Falmouth, March 21. Here is come in the *Margaret of Byron* from *Maryland*; She came out in Company of 3 other Vessels, who its thought are gone up the Channel. The *Spanish Alliance* arrived here last Saturday from the *Greyne*, and brought over a Courier from the Court of *Spain*. This day set Sail for that Part the *Spanish Expedition*, having on board the *Marquis de Grigny*, who came lately from *Flanders*, and is going to serve as General of the Horse in *Catalonia*.

Plimouth, March 22. On the 20th Sailed from hence for *Bilboa* Their Majesties Ships the *Chatham* and *James Galley*, with two Dutch Men of War. This morning put in here from the Eastward the *Nonfuch*, with Sir *William Pope* Governor of *New England*, and the *Edward* and *Mary* of *London* under her Convoy. This day arrived here our homeward bound *Canary Fleet*, being about 30 Sail, under the Convoy of Their Majesties Ships the *Oxford* and *Greenwich*, with a Fireship. The *Suedes* Man of War, who had been some time in this Port, put to Sea this Evening with several Merchant Ships bound for *Lisbon*.

Weymouth, March 23. Last Night came in here the *John* and *Francis* Ketch of *Sandwich*, *John Does* Master; She belongs to Their Majesties Ship the *Windsor Castle*, and had on board Lieutenant *Wheler*, and about 22 Men; On the back of the Lie of *Wight* they met a French Privateer of 6 Guns, 4 *Pattencross*, and full of Men, against whom the Ketch maintained a Fight for above an hour, and at last obliged the French to bear away; Of the English there was not one Man hurt, but they believe several of the Enemy were killed having seen them drop.

Purifmouth, March 24. On the 22d instant Their Majesties Ship the *Defiance* Sailed out of this Harbour to *Spitthead*. Colonel *Trelawney's* Regiment of Foot is expected here this day or to-morrow to Embark for *Flanders*.

Whitehall, March 24. This day the Right Honorable *Zere Earl of Westmerland*, took the usual Oaths, as Joynt Lord Lieutenant of the County of *Kent*, with the Right Honorable *Henry Lord Viscount Sydney*.

The Right Honorable *Charles Lord Lansdowne*, was Sworn likewise Joint Lord Lieutenant of the Counties of *Devon* and *Cornwall*, with the Right Honorable *John Earl of Bath*.

This day also *John Dye* Esq; was Sworn Clerk of Their Majesties most Honorable Privy Council in Ordinary.

This day was Published Their Majesties Proclamation appointing a General and Publick Fast to be observed throughout this Kingdom, on Friday the 8th day of *April* next, and thenceforth on the second Wednesday of every following month during the present War, for Imploing the Blessing and Protection of Almighty God in the Preservation of Their Majesties Sacred Persons, and Prosperity of Their Arms both at Land and Sea.
