Barito River Entrance—Direction of Submarine Cable Altered,

The Netherlands Government has given notice, dated 21st March, 1903, that the direction of the shore end of the submarine cable at the entrance to the Barito River has been altered; it has now been laid from the Telegraph Station at Little Musaug River in a westerly direction across the Barito entrance to the shoal extending from Pedada Tua Point, and from thence on the western side of the channel southward to the sea.

In consequence of this alteration, the white nun buoy, situated $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. 50° W. from the Telegraph Station, has been moved 5 cables to the northward to a position from which the Telegraph Station bears N. 65° E., distant one mile, and the black can buoy situated $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. 80° W. from the same station to a position from which the Telegraph Station bears S. 70° E., distant $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles.

Vessels are prohibited from anchoring anywhere between these buoys or in the area between the Telegraph Station bearing N. 65° E. and S. 70° E.

A red fixed light will be exhibited near the Telegraph Station.
