Turin, March 29. The Marquis de Leganes, Governor of the Milanese, arrived here yesterday with the Count de Luvigny; The Duke went a Mile or two to receive him, and the Cannon was fired round the Town: He comes to Confer with his Royal Highness about the Designs of the next Campaign; and to acquaint him that 8000 Foot, and 4000 Horse of the Troops of Milan, are ready to march at an hours warning, and that the rest will be so in a very short time. The Duke proposes to bring into the Field 9 or 10000 Men of his own Forces, and to that end great diligence is used in making the Recruits. The French have sent some Troops into the County of Nice, and have posted 400 Men at Broglia, and as many at Sospella, two Villages that are Passes towards this Country; and have seized upon a little place called Dolce Aqua, just upon the Borders of Genoua, but depending upon the County of Nice. 'Twas lately Reported, That 16 French Battalions were come to Sassa, and into the Vallies of Pragelas and Ouz, but we hear since that they are not above 8, and that new Levies, and full of Boys; and hitherto the Enc-

mies Preparations on this side seem to be only intended for the Defensive. There is a Report, That the Vaudois made the last Week an Incurtion into the Enemies Country about Coëseau Dauphine, and brought back a good deal of Cattle.

Warsaw, March 26. The King of Poland continues still at Lemberg, where his stay has been longer then was at first intended, by Reason of the ill Weather, and Badness of the Ways, which beginning to be pretty passable again, the Court is now shortly expected here. In the mean time no care is wanting to hasten the Preparations for the next Campaign; The Officers are buied with making their Recours; Magazines are providing in our Frontier Places; A very fine Train of Artillery is preparing; The King is resolv'd to go himself again at the head of the Army; And the Moscovites promise to give the Tartars a great Diversion. and in order thereto to bring a very numerous Army into the Field by the beginning of May. Our Advices from Turkey say, That great Preparations are making throughout all the Ottoman Empire for carrying on the War this Summer; That the Turks intend to turn their main force towards Hungary, and give out that the Grand Signior will go himself into the Field.

Vienna, April 3. The Resolution holds of turning the Blockade of Great Waradin into a formal Siege, and to that end Orders are given for forming an Army in Upper Hungary with all the diligence possible; But the Imperial Troops that were to come from Transylvania, under the Command of General Veterani, are now Commanded to stop on the River Maros, the better to cover that Principality. At the same time several Regiments are ordered to encamp near Esseck, to observe the Enemies Motions on that side; For we hear that the Turks who lately drew together about Belgrade, have pass'd the Save, and made an Incurtion into Sclavonia, and gave out that they would march towards Esseck. They write from Dobruza of the 25th past, That they had certain advice that the Garrison of Great Waradin was reduced to 500 Men, and that they suffered very much for want of Necessaries; but that the Principal Officers still encouraged them with Assurances, that they would be Relieved in a short time. From Peter Waradin it is Reported, That a considerable Party of Turks had appeared near Ilucke, and seem'd to have some design upon that place; And that the Radziens in the Emperors Service had taken a large Turkish Boat near Salauement, killed all the Persons in it, and carried off a good Boory.

Hydelberg, April 8. The Imperial Troops quartered about Hailbron have Orders to draw nearer towards the Rhine. The French are likewise in motion in Alsaco, and about Spire; but 'tis believ'd they are only going to change some of their Garrisons, or perhaps to send some more Detachements towards Flanders. The Snaphans have lately cut off a French Party of about 40 Men, and taken some Provisions, and 3000 Florins in Money, which they were conducting from Keyserhausene to Wackerheim.

Cologne, April 11. The Elector of Cologne being recovered of his late Indisposition, intends, according to his first Resolution, to pursue his Journey to Ansburg in Westphalia, in order to hold the States of the Province of Saurlande. The Troops of Munster that are to go to Hungary will certainly begin their march on the 20th of this Month. This City raises 800 Men for the Emperors Service. We have advice that the French continue to March towards the Low Countries all the Troops they can possibly

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Hamburg, April 11. The Letters from *Berlin* of the 8th instant tell us, That the Elector of *Saxony* had been ill of a Fever, but it was gone off again; And that the Preparations were continued for his Marriage with the Margravine of *Anspach*, which will be Celebrated the 24th of this month at *Lezgow*; after which the Elector of *Brandenburg* will go for *Cleves*, the 18th of *May* being fixed for his setting out from *Berlin*. We hear that the Danes, who are detigned for *Hungary*, will soon pass the *Baltick*; The Foot are to Land at *Roßtocke*, the Horse at *Lubicke*, and from those places are to continue their march through *Silesia*.

Paris, April 11. The French Kings departure for *Flanders* is put off till towards the middle of the next month; Some say he will set out the Tenth, others the Fifteenth. The *Duchefs of Chartres*, the *Duchefs of Bourbon*, the *Princes de Conti*, and *Madam de Maintenon*, with other Ladies of Quality, are to be of this Journey, and are to remain at *Valenciennes*, or some other of the Frontier places during the Campaign. Half of the French and Swiss Guards are to begin their march on the 20th of this Month, the rest stay at *Versailles* till the Court removes; The Guards du Corps and the *Genes d'Armes* are to march the first of *May*, and the Musketers the 8th and 9th of the same Month. 'Tis said that we shall have 3 Armies in *Flanders* this Summer; One Comanded by the French King in Person, and under him by the *Marschal d'Humieres*; Another by the *Duke of Luxembourg*; And the third between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse* by the *Marquis de Boufflers*. The Troops continue to march towards *Normandy* for the Guard of those Coasts. Of the 400 New Created Offices of Commisaries at War, there are yet but 19 sold; for which Reason the Extraordinary Treasurers at War are obliged to take them all into their Hands, paying for each 10000 Crowns; in consideration whereof they are allowed an abatement of three Sols per Livre; and those they cannot sell they may execute by Depaies, and receive the Sales and Profits of them. We have an account by the last Letters from *Rome*, That great Solicitations were used by the French Cardinals to obtain the *Popes Bulls* likewise for those Bishops that allied at the Assembly of 1682, who offer to submit to any Conditions the *Pope* shall think fit to impose upon them.

Brussels, April 13. The *Prince de Nassau Siegen*, Governor of *Guelders*; The *Prince de Barbançon*, Governor of *Namur*; *Don Francisco de Sances*, of *Antwerp*, and the *Count de Brosses*, are come hither to Compliment the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and to receive his Orders. The intermed Reform will be speedily made, his Electoral Highness being resolved, as we are told, to reduce the Part of the Service of these Countries to 22000, and the Horse to 8000. The States of *Brabant* are to meet the 17th of this Month to consider of the Extraordinary Subsidies for the War. The *Marquis de Gassmaga*, our late Governor, having taken his leave of the Elector, went away privately on Thursday last to *Denainville*, where he purposes to stay till the Convoy is ready at *Ostend*, which is to conduct him to *Spain*. The *Prince de Vaudemont* went hence yesterday for *Loos*. *Lieutenant General Overkirke* is returned hither from taking a Review of the Dutch Cavalry at *Mastrecht*, *Tongres*, and other places on that side. An Apartment is preparing in the Palace for the Elector of *Cologne*, who is shortly expected here.

Hague, April 15. The Letters from the Court at *Loos* of yesterday tell us, That the *Prince de Vaudemont* was hourly expected there from *Flanders*; That the *Count de Solmes* was gone to visit all the Quarters of our Forces. And that *Sir William Colt*, Their Majesties Envoy Extraordinary to the *Dukes of Lorraine*, parted from thence the day before on his return to *Zell*. The *Marquis de Castell Moncayo* arrived here on the 12th from *Brussels*, to assist at the Congress of the Allies as Plenipotentiary from the Crown of *Spain* till the arrival of *Don Francisco Bernardo de Quiros*, who is named by the Catholic King to reside here on his part. The Elector and Electores of *Palatinate* are expected here to morrow. The *Marquis de Fleury* is returned to *Vienna* with the Sermon he has raised in these Provinces to serve in the Fleet of Barks and Gallies which the Emperor intends to employ this Summer on the *Danube*. The States of *Holland* meet to morrow.

Plimouth, April 5. Yesterday came into this Port the *Crown Frigate* from the Eastward; And this day the *Anne* and *Sarah* of *London* from *Barbadoes*, but last from *Brissel*.

Portsmouth, April 7. On the 5th instant came to Spithead Rear Admiral *Evertzen*, with several Dutch Men of War from the Coast of *Holland*; and one English and a Dutch Vessels, which they lately retook from some French Privateers.
