SWINE-FEVER INFECTED AREAS.

The following Areas are now *Areas Infected with Swine-Fever* under the above-mentioned Acts:—

Cumberland.—An Area comprising the petty sessional divisions of Allerdale Below Derwent, Keswick, Derwent (including its detached part), Maryport, and Workington, and the parishes of Harrington, Distington, Parton, Moresby, Hensingham, Weddicar, Arlecdon, Salter and Eskett, and Lamplugh, in the administrative county of Cumberland; and also comprising the boroughs of Whitehaven and Workington (27 May, 1903).

Essex.—See end of List.

Gloucestershire.—An Area comprising the petty sessional divisions of Cirencester (except the parishes of Winstone, Syde, Brimpsfield, Elk-

stone, Colesborne, and Rendcomb), Stroud (except the parishes of Miserden, Cranham, Painswick, Pitchcombe, and Whiteshill), Nailsworth, and Tetbury (except the parish of Didmarton), and the parish of King's Stanley, in the administrative county of Gloucester (15 May, 1903).

Hertfordshire and Middlesex.—An Area comprising the petty sessional division of Barnet, in the administrative county of Hertford; and also comprising the petty sessional divisions of Gore, Highgate, Edmonton, and South Mimms, in the administrative county of Middlesex (29 April, 1903).
