The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have recently drawn the attention of the Secretaries of the several British Yacht Clubs possessing Admiralty Warrants to the circular letter of the 24th May, 1883, in which they were informed that yachts flying the white or blue ensigns of His Majesty's Fleet would be treated by the Ottomau Government as Men of War, and would consequently be compelled to obtain an Imperial Iradé before being allowed to pass the Dardanelles; also that to avoid such detention it was recommended that owners of yachts should be advised to hoist the plain red ensign (i.e. the red ensign undefaced by any distinguishing Club mark) when wishing to pass the Dardanelles and during their sojourn in Turkish waters.
