Rome, March 29.

ON Monday last a private Consistory was held, where the last four Preconised Bishops of *Amiens, Grasse, Sees, and Tarbis* were proposed; and at the same time, the Pope proceeded to the preconization of four others, viz. the Bishops of *Orange, Tournay, Dignes, and Privert*; not one of the Cardinals, when the usual question was put, opposing it. After these there remain only the Bishops of the Assembly in 1682, that want their Bulls, for whom, very pressing solicitations are used by the Cardinals *d'Estree, and de Fourbin*, with offers on their behalf of submitting to whatever the Pope shall think fit to require of them. The Prince Royal of Denmark being attended last Monday by the Counts *de Vafno and Falconeri*, saw privately the Consistory, and was afterwards entertained with a Collation, by the Pope's order, in the Gallery of the *Vatican*. The Cardinal *de Chigi* continues very weak, with little hopes of his recovery.

Milan, April 2. Our Governor the Marquis *de Leganez*, is gone to *Turin*, to conferr with the Duke of *Savoy* about the Affairs of the Campaign. The Troops of this State are preparing for their march towards *Piedmont*, which we are told they will begin about the middle of this Month. The Engineers *Beretta* and *Sesto* are gone towards the Valley of *Aost*, to fortify, as 'tis said, some place on that side. The Garil. n of *Alexandria* have taken 2000 Doppies which the French were sending to *Cajal*.

Venice, April 4. We have an account from *Malta*, by Letters of the 8th of the last month, that the Gallies of that Order were fitting out, and would be ready to put to Sea in a fortnight or three weeks, in order to joyn our Fleet in the *Levant*; and that the Great Master had chosen *Don Giovanni*, Prior of *Barletta*, to Command the said Squadron. This Senate have not yet named a General of their Land Forces; but seem to have thoughts of choosing the Baron *de Buelke*, a *Suede*, for that Command; and the Count *de Trautmandorf* to be Lieutenant General. Several Vessels are arrived in *Istria* from the *Levant*, but bring no News.

Vienna, April 6. The Ministers of this Court have had several meetings, to regulate the march of the Auxiliary Forces that are coming to serve the Emperor in *Hungary*, and Commissaries are appointed to receive and conduct them through the Imperial Territories. The Troops of *Manstere* are to Embarque at *Denavert* on the *Danube*; and in order hereunto, a convenient number of Vessels is provided for them. The Imperial Forces will now very quickly begin to move towards the places of Rendezvous; the main Army is to have theirs near *Buda*, towards the end of the next month. And in the mean time, Orders are given for reinforcing the Troops that are posted about *Great Waradin*, upon advice, that the Turks have drawn together several Thousand men between *Jeno* and *Giulo*; and that they have positive Orders from the Grand Signior, to attempt the relief of *Great Waradin*, whatever it cost. The Turks are making several new Fortifications, at *Belgrade* as we are inform'd by the Engineer *Cornaro*, who being a Prisoner, lately escaped out of their hands. We received advice yesterday from *Constantinople*, that the Vizier had caused the Aga of the Janifaries to be strangled; the Captain *Bassa* to be deposed, and sent to the *Dardanelles*, and a Page of the Grand Signiors put into his place; That the late Caimacan was banished to *Negropon*, and that there was great murmuring and confusion at *Constantinople*, by reason of their want of Trade and good Money.

Francfort, April 13. Two Bavarian Regiments of Horse that are going to serve in *Flanders*, are expected to morrow at *Miltenberg* on the *Main*, from whence they are to pass by water to *Cologne* or *Nays*. Prince *Louis of Neubourg*, Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order, passed by this City yesterday in his way to *Aschaffenburg*, where he intends to stay a day or two with the Elector of *Mentz*; and after that, to proceed on his journey to *Vienna*.

Cologne, April 15. We hear from *Coblentz* that a Party of 55 *Hussars*, Commanded by a Lieutenant, have lately surprised, near a place called *Kirn*, a French Party of 80 Horse; they killed 30 upon the place, and took several Prisoners, among whom was the the Lieutenant Colonel of the Regiment of *Toulouse*. From *Trier* they write that the Regiment of *Lions*, which lately arrived there, had Orders to march to *Metz*, and from thence to *Flanders*. The Elector *Palatine* sets out this day from *Dusseldorp*, with a small Train for *Holland*.

Hamburg, April 15. They write from *Copenhagen*, that the Troops which the King of *Denmark* sends to the Emperors assistance, would Embark the 25th of this month, in order to their passing over to *Rostock*, in the Country of *Mechlenburg*.

Paris, April 14. The French King's departure towards *Flanders* is fixed for the 15th of the next month; and the Duke of *Luxemburg* goes about 8 or 10 days before, to prepare things for the General review. The *Marschal de Bellefontaine* parted from hence on the 12th Instant for *Normandy*, where the Troops that are to serve under his Command, will have their Rendezvous, near a place called *Carentan*. The Letters from *Provence* give an account, that the Count *d'Estree*, who was coming to joyn our Fleet at *Brest*, had met with a violent Storm off of *Majorca*, which very much shattered the Ships under his Command, and Unmasted some of them, and forced him to return to the Isles of *Heiras* to refit, where he was still on the 30th of the last Month. We have advice likewise, that divers Ships that were going from *Bordeaux*, and the Coasts of *Xantonge* with Provisions for our Fleet, have been lately cast away in bad Weather; and that the Ships of the Marquis *de Nesmond's* Squadron, which lay in the Road of *Camarac*, about four Leagues from *Brest*, have suffered considerable damage. The last Letters from *Piedmont* tell us, that the Duke of *Savoy* was drawing his Troops together, and that their Motions shew he has a design to attack *Pignorol* or *Susa*. We hear that the *Tripolins* have imprisoned the French Consul, and that they threaten to declare War against us.

Brussels, April 16. On Sunday last arrived here an Express, who came by Sea from *Spain*, with Letters for the Elector of *Bavaria*, and Bills of Exchange for 500000 Crowns for the Service of these Countries. The Count *de Solmes* is come hither to take a review of the Dutch Regiments of Foot in Garrison here. The French work with great diligence on the Fortifications of *Mons*, and have undertaken to level a Hill that commands the Town; for which purpose they intend to employ 18 or 20 Battalions, who are daily expected there. We hear, That Corn begins to grow very dear in all the Conquered Countries, and even in *Artois* and *Cambrisis*, which are the most fertile of all those Provinces, and which used to supply the rest: So that a Measure of Wheat is now sold for six Florins, and Rye for four, which is double of what was paid for it the last year.

Hague, April 18. The Elector *Palatine* lay last night at *Arnhem*, and it's thought he had this day an interview with His Majesty at *Loos*, and that his Electoral Highness will be this Evening at *Amsterdam*; whither Monsieur *Hetterman*, his Minister here, is gone to meet him; The Electores is not come this Journey, by reason 'tis believed

She is with Child. The Prince de Vaudemont pass'd yesterday through *Amesfort* in his way to *Loe*. Monsieur *Dyckvelt* is returned from thence, and has this day given the States an account of the posture of Affairs in *Brabant*; and in few days will be going back to *Brussels*. Most of the Men of War fitted out for this Summers Expedition by the Admiralty at *Rotterdam*, are sail'd to the Rendezvous on the Coasts of *England*; and the rest will speedily follow. The *Amsterdam* Squadron is likewise ready to put to Sea.

Dublin, April 2. Yesterday arrived here from *Chester*, the Lord Chief Justice *Reynells*, and Mr. Solicitor *Levings*. The following Proclamation has been published here concerning the *Irish* that claim any benefit by the Articles of *Limerick* and *Galway*.

Whereas by Our Proclamation bearing Date the 11th day of *January* last, in order to the ascertaining what Persons are comprehended in the Articles of *Limerick*, We did Publish and Declare, That all such as claim any Benefit by the said Articles, should by the Twentieth day of *February* last, in a several Petition to be left with the Clerk of the Council, or his Deputy at the Council-Chamber in *Dublin*, particularly set forth the Grounds upon which each of them pretend a Right to the said Articles, and the County, Town, and Parish where the said Lands, Tenements and Hereditaments, to which they desire Restitution, lie, with the particular Name, and quantity of each Denomination; as also their own present place of abode or residence, together with the place where they inhabited in the first year of the Reign of the late *K. James*. And whereas by Our Order of the 18th of *February* last, We did, for the Reasons therein set forth, enlarge the time for putting in such Claims as aforesaid to the first day of *April* next: And whereas, since the publishing Our said Order, We are given to understand, That several persons, who, on Our Proclamation aforesaid, had put in their Claims in manner as aforesaid, have on some pretences or other withdrawn them, and others who do expect the benefit of the said Articles have neglected to put in their Claims, as by Our Proclamation and Order as aforesaid was required: And whereas We have received His Majesty's late Directions for Our speedy proceeding, not only on the Claims of such who expect the benefit of the Articles of *Limerick*, but also those which were granted to the Town and Garrison of *Galway*: To the end therefore that such persons as claim the benefit of the Articles granted on the Surrender of either of the places aforesaid, may have opportunity to make out their Right and Title to the benefit thereof, We do hereby Publish and Require, That all such who have so withdrawn their Claims, or have not already put in their Claims in manner as aforesaid to the said Articles of *Limerick* and *Galway*, or either of them, That they bring them in to the Clerk of the Council, or his Deputy, before the 15th day of *April* next ensuing the Date hereof, and that they do prosecute their said Claims with effect on the several days whereon they shall be posted up to be heard, otherwise We do hereby declare they shall be postponed as to their hearing, until all other the Claims exhibited before Us by the 15th day of *April* aforesaid shall be Heard and Adjudged. And We do likewise hereby Publish and Declare, That upon *Wednesday* the 6th day of *April* next We will begin upon the Claims of such of the persons aforesaid as are already entered with the Clerk of the Council, and from thenceforth will proceed, naming the Persons in one or more Lists or Lists from time to time to be posted up at the Council-Chamber for that purpose, wherein ten days notice at least shall be given, to the end the persons concerned may be prepared to make good their respective Claims, which shall be heard in priority of Time and Order, as they have been or shall be so brought in as aforesaid. And We do hereby further Publish and Declare, That from and after the 6th day of *April* next aforesaid, We will sit each *Friday*, *Monday* and *Wednesday* weekly, for the hearing and adjudging the aforesaid Claims, as well those already brought in, as those which hereafter shall be brought in by the time so limited as aforesaid for that purpose: And lastly, Whereas several Protestants did inhabit in the City of *Limerick* and Town of *Galway* aforesaid, during the Sieges of those Places, so as no one who claims the benefit of the Articles upon the surrender of them, can want the Evidence hereafter expected upon their Adjudication, We do Declare, that we do expect the Testimony of at least three Credible Witnesses, *vis* voce, whereof one to be a Protestant, for Proof of each Persons Qualification to the Articles aforesaid, who claims to have been within the City of *Limerick* and Town of *Galway* aforesaid, and thereby to be comprized within the said Articles, or either of them.

Yarmouth, April 11. Yesterday pass'd through this Road to the Southward, about 200 Sail of Colliers with their Convoy.

Westminster, April 12. The Parliament met this day, and was prorogued, by Commission, till the 24th day of *May* next.
