Rome, April 5.

THE Popes Gallies are fitting out, in order to join the Venetian Fleet in the Levant; and the Land Men that are to embark on them, are ordered to march to *Civita Vecchia*. The Cardinals *d'Estree* and *Fourbin* continue their Sollicitations on behalf of the French Bishops that assisted in the Assembly, of 1682, but hitherto have not been able to prevail with the Pope to Grant them his Bulls, as he has done to the other new Bishops. Cardinal *Chigi* is very weak, and its thought he will hardly recover.

Turin, April 5. The Marquis *de Leganez* is returned to *Milan*, and our Duke is gone with the Count *de Louvigny*, *Maître de Camp* General of the Forces of the *Milaneze*, towards the Valley of *Aost*, to view the Passes on that side. In the mean time the Preparations for the Campagne are continued here with great diligence; and it's generally believed that the Resolution is taken to begin it with the Siege of *Susa* or *Pignerol*; which the French seem to be very apprehensive of, and therefore are putting those places, especially the last, into the best posture of defence they can. We had an account about a Fort-night ago, that 8 French Battalions, of new raised Men were come to *Susa*, and into the Vallies of *Pragelas* and *Oulx*; and that 16 others would speedily follow them, but we have not since heard that any more of their Troops are come into those Parts; And by the Preparations they have yet made on this side, it appears they have no other design than to act Defensively this Summer; They have at present not above 3000 men in the whole County of *Nice*.

Milan, April 9. Our Governor is come back from *Turin*; and we are told that the Troops, who are to serve in *Piedmont*, will now very shortly begin their march thither in order to open the Campagne. The Troops of *Wirtemberg* in the Service of this State, were mustered this Week at *Lodi*, and 40000 Crowns paid to the Duke of *Wirtemberg's* Resident; after which, 6 Troops of Horse, 3 of Dragoons, and 3 Companies of Foot were Reformed, and the Men made use of towards recruiting the rest. The Recruits for the German Forces have met with some difficulties in their passage through the Country of the *Grisons*, by the means of the French Ambassador in *Suisserland*, but they are now removed, and a free passage granted them.

Venice, April 11. By Letters from *Napoli di Romania* of the 15th of the last month, we have an account, That the Captain General had taken a Review of all the Troops of this State quartered thereabouts, and that he expected with some impatience the Succors that have been promised him from hence, intending to take the Field so soon as they were arrived. He had sent out a Squadron to cruize in the *Archipelago*, and to hinder the Conjunction of the Corsairs of *Barbary* with the Turkish Fleet; and had ordered the Garrisons of *Suda* and *Spina Longa*

in the Kingdom of *Candia* to be changed, upon a suspicion that the Turks had some Intelligence in those places.

Vienna, April 13. General *Heusler* goes from hence to morrow for *Upper Hungary*; where five Imperial Regiments are already on their march towards *Great Waradin*, in order to reduce that Place; and 4000 Peasants are Summoned in, to work in the Siege that's going to be formed for that purpose. Several Regiments are at the same time ordered to march towards *Esscke* to reinforce that Garrison, and to observe the Turks, who are still in a Body in *Sclavonia*, expecting a Reinforcement of 4000 men from *Belgrade*. The Count *de Caprara* has since his arrival here assisted at several Conferences of War. A great Train of Artillery is preparing to be sent by Water to *Hungary*. The Fleet of Gallies and Barks which is to serve on the *Danube*, under the Command of the Marquis *de Heury*, will be ready by the middle of the next month. The Letters from *Constantinople* of the 18th of February give an account, That the New Grand Visier, *Alt Passa* had made great Alterations among the principal Officers of that Court, removing all those that gave him any Jealousie. That he had put out the Tugh or Horse Tails, as a Sign of his departure from *Adrianople*, which 'twas believed might be in *April*, but that he intended to stay some time at *Sophia*, and would not be at *Belgrade* till *June*; That his Army, as the Turks gave out, would consist of 50000 Foot, and 40000 Horse, but most of them new raised men; and that *Teckey* was to Act with a separate Body towards *Transilvania*.

Frankfort, April 20. Two Bavarian Regiments of Horse, one of which is the Electors Life Guard, march through *Frankenland* towards *Miltenberg*, from whence they will proceed by Land to *Flanders*, the design of their passing by Water on large Floats as far as *Cologne* or *Nuys*, being found impracticable.

Cologne, April 22. The Elector of *Cologne* is so well recovered of his late Indisposition, that he intends to come hither to morrow, and from hence to go on to *Flanders*. A Party of Germans met some days ago with a small French Party near *Wormes*, of whom they took 7 or 8 Prisoners, and 20 Horses, and brought them to *Bensheim* in the *Bergstract*.

Paris, April 21. The Regiment of French Guards begins its march towards *Flanders* the 27th of this month; and the *Gens d'Armes* and Light Horse are to follow the beginning of the next. The Irish, who are but meanly provided for, and most of them very ill Cloathed, have committed great Disorders in their march to *Normandy*, where they plundered and burnt divers Houses, and killed several of the Inhabitants, of which the Intendant of *Caen* has sent a complaint to the French Court. The Letters from *Brest* confirm the loss of 15 or 16 Vessels, by the late Storm, which were laden with Provisions for our Fleet. We have likewise the Confirmation from *Leghorne*, That the *Tripolins* had resolved to break with us, and emprisoned the French Consul.

Brussels, April 23: The States of Brabant are separated, after having renewed the Imposition upon Beer, and granted the extraordinary Subsidies in the same manner as they were formerly given to the Marquis de Gastanaga, but with this difference that the City of Antwerp has now consented thereto, which they would never do before. The French Troops begin to move on the Frontiers, which gives an opportunity to their Soldiers to Desert, of whom several come hither daily. We are told that the Enemy design to form a Camp about 3 Leagues from Mons, near Soignies. On our side we are likewise preparing for an Encampment, and 'tis said that our Troops will begin to march into the Field by the end of this month, which seems to be the more probable, by reason all the Hay, which comes hither in great quantities from Holland, is bought up for the use of His Majesties Forces. The Marquis de Gastanaga is gone to Ostend to embark there for Spain.

Loe, April 24. Monsieur Straatman, the Imperial Minister, arrived here yesterday, and having had Audience of the King, and delivered a Letter to His Majesty from the Emperor, he is returned again to the Hague. The Prince de Vaudemont parted from hence this Morning on his return to Brussels. The Elector of Palatin is expected here to-morrow; and 'tis said that the Elector of Cologne will be here in 3 or 4 days. General Fleming is come hither from the Elector of Brandenburg, and the Count Vanders Leppe from the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel.

Hague, April 25. The Sieurs Dankelman and Smetteas, the Brandenburg Ministers, are gone again to Loe to wait upon His Majesty, and to acquaint him as it's said, with his Electoral Highness's Resolution of coming to Cleves. The Dutch Fleet have their Orders to Sail to the Rendezvous on the Coast of England. The last Letters from Vienna give an account, That the Imperialists were going to lay formal Siege to Great Waradin, and that they were drawing together for that purpose 15000 Men, to be Commanded by General Hauser.

Hull, April 18. Yesterday arrived here 6 Ships belonging to this Town, under the Convoy of a Dutch Man of War of 52 Guns, from Rotterdam, whence they came in Company of about 40 English Vessels more, bound to several Ports on this Coast.

Yarmouth, April 18. On the 16th instant passed by on the Back of our Sands, to the Northward, 6 Men of War, Commanded by Captain Mees. Several Ships that came under their Convoy are arrived in this Road.

Plymouth, April 17. On the 15th instant sailed from hence for the Downes Their Majesties Ships the Oxford and Greenwich, and the Roebuck Fireship, with the homeward bound Canary Fleet, and divers other Merchantmen, that were in this Port, under their Convoy, being in all above 40 Sail. Yesterday came in the Crown from Falmouth, with the George and Mary from Jamaica; the William and the Eagle Pink from Virginia; and the Anne and Mary from the Barbadoes, all bound for London. And this day Their Majesties Ship the Centurion arrived here from the Eastward, and brought in with her 2 Vessels, one laden from Bourdeaux with Wine and Brandy, and the other from Rochel with Wine and Salt.

Portsmouth, April 19. Yesterday in the Evening Rear Admiral Carter came to Spithead, with the Squadron under his Command from the Eastward; They met off of Shoreham the Oxford and Greenwich, with the Canary Fleet, and other Merchantmen under their Convoy, bound for the Downes. The Bridget Galley is come in with a Prize she has taken laden with Pitch and Tar.

Deal, April 17. A French Privateer of twelve Guns and 50 men, belonging to Dunkirk, run aground yesterday on the Godwin Sand, whereupon one Men of War in the Downes manned out their Boats, who took her, and have got the Ship off.

Deal, April 19. This morning came into the

Downes the Canary Fleet, being about 26 Sail, besides 4 Ships from Barbadoes, one from Virginia, and some from O Porto, under the Convoy of two Men of War, and a Fireship. This day arrived likewise in the Downes the King William Yacht from Jamaica.
