

which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church called Christ Church Leyton situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church, Leyton.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church, Leyton, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the new parish (some-time district chapelry) of Saint Catherine, Leyton, in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans, which is bounded upon the north-east by the district parish of Leytonstone, in the said county and diocese, upon the south-east partly by the said district parish and partly by the consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Harrow Green, Leytonstone, in the said county and diocese, upon part of the south-west by the said consolidated chapelry, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the remaining part of the south-west, upon the north-west and upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity Harrow Green, Leytonstone, from the said new parish of Saint Catherine, Leyton, at the junction of Ruckholt-road, with Leyton-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Leyton-road, for a distance of twenty-two chains or thereabouts to its junction with Murchison-road, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Catherine, Leyton, from the parish of Leyton in the county and diocese aforesaid, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Murchison-road for a distance of forty chains or thereabouts (thereby following the last-mentioned boundary) to the junction of Murchison-road with Norlington-road, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Norlington-road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Pretoria-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Pretoria-road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to the point where Pretoria-road bends south-eastward and extending thence still north-eastward in precisely the same direction as before, and in a straight line for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Tottenham and Forest Gate branch line of the Midland Railway and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the said branch line of railway over Grove Green-road upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Catherine, Leyton, from the said district parish of Leytonstone.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said district parish of Leytonstone which is bounded upon the west by the above described portion of the new parish of Saint Catherine Leyton upon the south by the said consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity Harrow Green Leytonstone and upon the remaining sides that is to say upon the south-east and upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity Harrow

Green Leytonstone from the said district parish of Leytonstone at the centre of the bridge which carries Cathall-road over the Loughton and Ongar branch line of the Great Eastern Railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to the centre of the railway bridge where the last-mentioned line of railway is crossed by the Tottenham and Forest Gate branch line of the Midland Railway and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned line of railway for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of the railway bridge which crosses Grove Green-road upon the boundary which divides the said district parish of Leytonstone from the said new parish of Saint Catherine Leyton."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Albans.

WHEREAS by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, section thirty, as amended by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1893, it is provided (inter alia) that if the Council of a borough agree to petition and the Council thereupon petition the Queen for the alteration of the number and boundaries of its wards it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to fix the number of wards into which the borough shall be divided; and the borough shall be divided into that number of wards and that where an Order in Council has been so made the Secretary of State shall appoint a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of the wards and apportioning the Councillors among them.

And whereas the Right Honourable Aretas Akers-Douglas, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did by warrant under his hand and seal at Whitehall on the twenty-second day of October, one thousand nine hundred and three, in pursuance of the said thirtieth section of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, appoint William Ellis Hume-Williams, Esquire, one of His Majesty's Counsel, to be a Commissioner to prepare a scheme for determining the boundaries of and for apportioning the Councillors among the wards of the city of Coventry the number of such wards having been fixed by the Order of His Majesty in Council made in that behalf on the ninth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and three.

Now, therefore, I, the said William Ellis Hume-Williams, being such Commissioner as aforesaid, and in pursuance of the said warrant and appointment hereby declare this to be my scheme for determining the boundaries of the wards of the said city of Coventry and for apportioning the
