Bankrupt, Arthur John Emms, to be discharged as from 10th December, 1907, and it appearing that the Public Examination of the bankrupts was concluded on the 19th June, 1902	Bankrupt's assets are not of a value equal to 10s. in the pound on the amount of his unsecured liabilities; that the bankrupt, Henry George Emms, had omitted to keep such books of account as are usual and proper in the business carried on by him, and as sufficiently disclose his business transactions and financial position within the three years immediately preceding his bankruptcy; and had been guilty of misconduct in relation to his property and affairs, viz.:—In having, subsequent to 1st January, 1899, continued to trade and incur liabilities without having ascertained his financial position or the result of his trading, he having been throughout the whole of the said period insolvent, and trading at a loss Bankrupt's assets are not of a value equal to 10s. in the pound on the amount of his unsecured liabilities; that the bankrupt, Arthur John Emms, had omitted to keep such books of account as are usual and proper in the business carried on by him, and as sufficiently disclose his business transactions and financial position within the three years immediately preceding his bankruptcy; had continued to trade after knowing himself to be insolvent; and had been guilty of misconduct in relation to his property and affairs, viz.:—In having, subsequent to October, 1901, by selling stock below cost price, and by effecting exchanges, on which there was heavy loss, traded in a reckless manner, and sacrificed the interest of his creditors
