## SCHEDULE.

1. For the purposes of this Order Castle Bay shall be described as that part of the sea bounded on the west, north, and east by the shores of Barra Isle, and on the south-west by an imaginary straight line drawn from the southwest point of the Island of Ornsay in a north-west direction to Ru Glass.

2. All fishing boats while at anchor shall rig in jib and mizzen booms and no oars or spars are to

project from stem-head or stern.

3. In selecting anchorage, masters of vessels should anchor as close to the shore as is consistent with safety so as to leave a clear fairway in mid-channel.

4. All vessels if proposing to remain in harbour more than twenty-four hours are to be moored with two anchors so as to occupy as little of the

anchorage space as possible.

5. All vessels waiting to be loaded or employed in transhipping cured herrings shall remain outside the south-western boundary of the bay until they are ready to commence loading.

6. Masters and owners of vessels shall comply with any requisition made by any officer of a Government Department or Sea Fishery Officer with the view of relieving congestion of traffic and maintaining a fairway to the Pier.
