

# The London Gazette.

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*Pendennis, July 6.*

**O**N Saturday last and yesterday, came into this Port, the *Constant Katherine* of London, intended for the *Barbados*, one ship for *Cadix*, and 6 or 7 smaller vessels, all of them outwards bound.

*Plymouth, July 7.* Yesterday arrived here three ships of this Town from the *Streights*, whereof two of them bound for London, the other to unlade in this Port.

*Newcastle, July 7.* Here are now in this Harbor about one hundred and fifty sail of ships which a daily employ'd in taking in their lading, and about fifty sail more come into *Sunderland*, and more daily appearing.

*Rome, June 21.* We in every Consistory expect the promotion to the six vacancies in the sacred Collidge, but as yet, the Pope has not made his choice, nor has any thing of moment pass'd in the last Consistory, except the proposal of some of the long vacant Bishopsricks of *Portugal*, which was till then deferred, by reason of their differences of wars with the Crown of *Spain*. The Pope continues still his zeal for the defence of *Candia*, and besides his Letters sent to his several Nuncio's in the Courts of Foreign Princes, commanding them to employ all their Rhetorick to move for assistance, He has also dispatched Letters under his own hand to the Sophy of *Persia*, inviting him to take this opportunity to make War upon the Grand Signior.

Letters from *Messina* of the 5th instant inform us, that the Popes Gallies under the command of *Don Vincenzo Rospigliosi*, appearing before that place, were presently attended by 7 of the Malta Gallies which there waited their arrival, and immediately went out to meet them, betwixt whom pass'd the usual Sea Complements, thundred from their Canons; which ended, they came altogether into Port, from whence, after a day or two, they intended to put to sea again for *Candia*.

*Genova, June 27.* A Courier is lately pass'd by this place from *Paris*, on his way for *Rome*, part of his business being said to make an offer of employing the French Gallies as the Pope shall dispose of them; their men of War have been lately seen off *Mouaco*, standing towards *Thoulon*, but their Gallies are said to be put in at *Porto Femeira* in *Elba*, where they intend to Catene.

The 19th instant, returned hither from *Barcellona*, the Gally which was by order of this Re-publick, lent to Seignior *Borromeo*, the Popes Nuncios, sent to reside in the Court of *Spain*, having by the way met with another of our Gallies on her voyage for *Spain*, for the transportation of Seignior *Gio: Battista Pallavicino*, sent Envoy from this Re-publick to the same Court.

On Tuesday last, arrived here the Dutch Convoy, consisting of ten ships, whereof two men of War, having in their way touched at *Cadix*, and some other Ports of *Spain*, richly laden upon the accounts of several Merchants of this City; some of these ships, as soon as they have unladen, are said to be designed for the *Levant*, laden with all military Provisions for the service of the Venesian Armie.

Our fortifications at *Savona* and the Port de *Vado*, are carried on with much diligence, our apprehensions of the French still continuing, especially, since we are informed that their forces in *Dauphine* and *Provence* are daily upon the increase, and nothing publickly resolv'd for their employment.

From *Milan* we are told, that the Governour, attended by the General Officers and Principal Commanders of the

Army, went on Thursday last towards the *Chatteruse* of *Pavia*, and the next day near that City took a view of a great part of the Cavalry belonging to that State, with the two German Regiments, that of Horse, commanded by the Baron de *Soye*, and that of Foot, commanded by the Baron de *Keserstein*, and from thence, intended for *Lodi*, where other forces were drawn up for his Review; the same Order he intends to follow in all places under his Government, that having an exact List of all his forces, he may the more conveniently proceed to such a Reformation, as may be best suit with the service of the King his Masters.

*Venice, June 20.* Some Letters from the *Armata* inform us of the good condition and posture of our affairs in *Candia*, where, by the arrival of several Convoys sent from hence, they are furnished with great plenty of all sorts of Provisions and Ammunition; and that they had so effectually repaired all their Works, especially, the Fort of *Panigra*, upon which the Turks had the last Summer, done the greatest execution, that it is now in better state of defence than formerly to make resistance; but that the Turks still continued before the Town, and had lately received some encouragement, by the landing of about five thousand Janisaries, who adventured thither in a Tempestuous season, which by its exceeding violence, had obliged our General *Morofai* with his Gallies and Galeasses to put into Port.

On Wednesday last, was sung at *St. Mark's Church*, 76 *Deums*, in the presence of the Duke and Senate; with extraordinary solemnity for the happy conclusion of the peace between the two Crowns of *France* and *Spain*.

Some few days since arrived here, the Interpreter *Gril'd*, sent hither by the Grand Signior, pressing the Senate with some earnestness, to dispatch their publick Minister to him, to conferre about a Treaty of peace, to which he seems much inclinable, bringing with him, Passports for such person as should by the Senate be sent in that employment, which has been taken into consideration; and the said Passport ordered by the Senate to be sent to *Zante*, to Seignior *Andria Valiere*, General of the three Islands, with Order to transport himself with all convenienc speed for *Constantinople*, under the Character of Envoye from this Republick.

*Brussels, July 1.* The Marquis de *Castel Rodrigo* still continues his care for the future settlement of these Countreys in such a posture as may best secure it against any sudden attempts; to which end, the States of *Flanders* and *Brabant* seem contented to contribute largely towards the maintenance of a standing force, and 'tis believed, the other Provinces will be ready to furnish also their proportions. This City has granted 60 thousand Florins to his Excellency, besides the share they bear in the publick Subsidies, which he assures them shall be expended in finishing the four Bastions, which are raising for the defence of this City.

The Marquis is likewise projecting a future Regulation for the Army, and has sent for the Governours of the several Provinces and Cities under his Government, to communicate the same to them, by which he intends to establish the pay of the Army after the rate of 6000 Florins to each General de *Bataille*, 3000 to every Colonel of Foot, each Captain of Horse to have 2000, and every Foot Captain, 1000, with a proportionable establishment for the inferior Officers, and common Soldiers. And that Commissioners be appointed by the States, to be present at the Musters, and take care for the payment of the forces, with an injunction to the Captains, that they suffer none of their Soldiers to stirre from their Quarters without leave, ordering every Regiment to consist of 1000 men, and the Captains to be answerable
