

of Surrey and in the diocese of Canterbury, being:—

“(1.) All that portion of the parish of Croydon, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon the west and upon the south-west by the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Croydon, upon the south by the new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, from the said parish of Croydon, at the junction of West-street with High-street, and extending thence northward along the middle of High-street for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Laud-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Laud-street for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Church-road, upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Croydon from the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Croydon.

“(2.) And also all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, which is bounded upon the west by the said parish of Croydon, upon the north partly by the said parish of Croydon and partly by the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Croydon, upon the north-east by the said parish of Croydon, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east, upon the south-east, upon the south and upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Croydon from the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, at the junction of Upper Coombe-street with High-street and with the high road called South End, and extending thence southward along the middle of the said high road called South End for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Parker-road, and extending thence first westward and then south-westward along the middle of Parker-road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with South-bridge-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of South-bridge-road for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Bramley Hill, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said road called Bramley Hill for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the north-western end of the wall or fence forming the north-eastern boundary of the house and premises known as Addington Lodge and numbered five on Bramley Hill and situate on the south-eastern side of the said road called Bramley Hill, and extending thence first south-eastward and then westward and then again south-eastward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to its south-eastern end upon the north-western side of Dering-road and extending thence generally south-westward but occasionally in other directions along the walls or fences at the backs of the houses and premises on the said south-eastern side of the said road called Bramley Hill for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to a point on the north-eastern side of Nottingham-road and extending thence first south-westward and in a direct line to the middle of Nottingham-road and then north-westward along the middle of Nottingham-road for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the said road called Bramley Hill, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said road called Bramley Hill for a distance of

five chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south-eastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the house and premises called Waldron Hyrst, and extending thence north-westward to and along the last-mentioned wall or fence for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its north-western end on the eastern side of Violet-lane, and extending thence due west and in a direct line to a point in the middle of Violet-lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, from the parish of Croydon aforesaid.

“THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

“The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Augustine, Croydon, in the said county and diocese, being:—

“All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, which is bounded upon the west by the said parish of Croydon, upon the south by the new parish of Christ Church, Purley, in the said county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester, upon the east by the said new parish of Saint Augustine, Croydon, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Augustine, Croydon, from the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, at the junction of Pampisford-road with Haling Park-road, and extending thence due west and in a straight line for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the public bridle path leading to Violet-lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, South End, Croydon, from the parish of Croydon aforesaid.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury.
