No. 672.—CHINA—EAST COAST.

Tung Yung—Intended Light.

The United States Government has given notice, dated 16th July, 1904, that the Commander of United States ship "Helena" reports that, on or about 15th June, a white group occulting light, showing groups of two eclipses every fifteen seconds, would be established on Tung Yung Island; it would be elevated 260 feet above high water, visible in clear weather from a distance of 24 miles, and shown from a white tower, 25 feet high, erected on the eastern point of the Island.

This light, which is of the 1st order, would be obscured by the land in a westerly direction.

Approximate position, lat. $26^{\circ} 22\frac{1}{2}'$ N., long. $120^{\circ} 30\frac{1}{2}'$ E.

Gnisvård—Fishing Lights Established.

The Swedish Government has given notice, dated 27th July, 1904, that two white fixed lights, elevated 21 and 14 feet respectively above the sea, would be established on posts, about 170 yards apart, $N. 81^{\circ} W.$ and $S. 81^{\circ} E.$, erected near the fishing station of Gnisvård, on the west coast of Gotland.

Approximate position, lat. $57^{\circ} 30' 20''$ N., long. $18^{\circ} 7' 0''$ E.

These lights will be exhibited annually from 1st August to the end of the year, whenever the fishing boats are at sea.
