 $M_J LORD$,

INCE your Lordship seems to think, that an Account in general of the Fleet's good Success, is not so satisfactory as one setting forth the Particulars, I here send it with as much Brevity as the Matter will admit of. I must consess I was not much inclined to trouble you in this nature, not being ambitious to see my Name in Print on any Occasion; but since 'tis your Lordships Commands, I am the more enclined to give you the best Information I am able of the Action, having seen several Printed Relations not very sincere.

Wednesday in the Evening, being the Eighteenth of May, standing over for Cape de Hague, I ordered Captain Gillam in the Chester, and the Charles Galley, to lie at such a distance to the Westward of the Fleet, that they might discover any Signals made from me.
