Turin, June 3. The German Troops pass daily by and through this place to the Camp, which is forming at Pignol, about 100 hours from Pignol. The Regiments of the Prince de Cambray, and Prince Eugene of Savoy are already arrived there. The Forces of Milan are likewise on their march, and some of them are expected here to morrow; and the Duke of Savoy will himself take the Field in few days. The French Troops do not yet stir to intrench themselves, unless it be in the most advantageous Posts from Perouse to Pignol. They write from Genoua of the 25th past, That 33 French Gallies had been seen passing by that Port, the other Vessels they had with them before Onaglia being sent home, which makes it believed that they will attempt nothing more.

Vienna, June 5. The Letters from the Camp before Great Waradin of the 27th past, tell us; That they had enlarged the Breeches, and finished their Lodgment on the Counterscarpe; and that the 26th at Night they began to fill the Ditch. The Besieged all this while continue obstinate in the defence of the Place, but have not of late made such frequent Sallies as they used to do, probably, to spare their Men, whose number is very much lessened since the beginning of the Blockade. The Deserters that come out of the Forts, say unanimously that the Garrison suffers extremely; but that the Aga of the Janisaries does still flatter them with the hopes of Relief; and to that end pretends often to receive advice of the march of the Successors designed them; but the Assurances he has given them of this kind have so often failed, that it cannot be thought this Artifice will be of any use much longer. 'Tis confirmed, That the Imperialists have quitted the Cave of Pescabara near Orsova, by Capitulation, but the Turks did not observe it, having used our Men very ill, and put many of them to the Sword. The Duke de Croÿ is gone to Command the Emperors Forces on the Save, until the arrival of Prince Louis of Baden, who continues still Indisposed with an Ague, though his Distemper is so far abated, that his Physicians give great hopes of his speedy Recovery. The Croats continue their Incurfions upon the Enemy with good Success. Their Imperial Majesties are returned from Luxembourg, and are now at their Palace of La Favorite near this City, where Prince James of Poland is shortly expected. My Lord Ambassador Harbord intends to part from hence about the middle of this Month towards Belgrade.

Mentz, June 9. The French Army lies encamped at Creutznach, consisting of about 13000 Men. Yesterday came higher 9 French Deserters, who say, That there is a great scarcity of Bread in their Camp; and that the talk was there that the Marschal de Lorges had received Orders to march towards the Rhine to hinder the Germans from passing that River.

Hydelberg, June 9. The Confederate Forces on this side are in motion in order to draw into the Field, and intend to form a Camp near Bunchjall; whither several Regiments of Foot and Horse, that had their Quarters about Eppingen, are now marching; as are likewise the Troops

Troops of *Franconia* and *Suabia*; and the two Regiments in Garrison here will march out to-morrow. We hear that the French have lately sent a Reinforcement of 2000 Men to *Philipsburg*.

Frankfort, June 11. The Forces of the Landgrave of *Hesse* are on their march towards *Mentz*, where they have laid a Bridge over the *Rhine*, and 1200 Hussars have already pass'd it. The Count *de Strum*, General of the Imperial Horse, arriv'd in this City yesterday, and the Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* is expected here to-morrow.

Hamburg, June 13. The Forces of *Hanover* were to be yesterday at their Rendezvous near *Harmelen*, and to begin their march this day towards the *Rhine*.

Cologne, June 13. The French, who are now in the Country of *Eyffels*, to the number of about 7000 Men, under the Command of *Monfieur de Joyeuse*, have begun to intrench themselves near *Marmagen*, between *Steinfelt* and *Blanckezheim*. The Forces of the Elector *Palatin* are encamp'd near *Zulpich*, within 4 Hours of the Enemy; They are about 5000, besides the Troops of our Elector, who join'd them this day. Those of *Murster* are supposed to be by this time on their march towards the *Rhine*. And we have advice that 6000 Hessians are already encamp'd in a Body on the other side of that River near *Mentz*; 'Tis said that they have Orders to pass the *Maine* at *Ruffelshem* and *Coffheim*, in order to joyn the Confederate Army, which is drawing together in the *Palatinate*. The French Army, under the *Marschal de Lorges*, reckon'd to be about 13000 Men, continues poit'd within 2 or 3 hours of *Mentz*.

Paris, June 13. The French Men of War that escap'd from the late Fight are scatter'd into several Ports; 16 or 18 are got into *St. Maloes*, but their fear carried them farther in then Ships of such Force used to go, so that divers of them run a-ground, and will hardly be got out again. The *Sieur Gabaret* is they say, come with 4 Ships to *Brest*; where the Count *d'Estree* arriv'd the 30th past with the *Thoulon* Squadron; but they have yet no News of the *Sieur de Nesmond*. The Irish continue to commit great disorders, and it's said that they will be dispers'd to prevent their committing more. The last Letters from our Camp before *Namur* tell us, That they opened their Trenches on the 7th instant against the Cattle, which they batter'd with 60 pieces of Cannon and 26 Mortars; and that the French King had sent all the Troops he could spare to reinforce the Duke of *Luxemburg's* Army, which was encamp'd behind the River *Mehaine*.

From His Majesties Camp on the *Mehaine*, June 16. The two Armies continue still in the same Camps; The great Rains, which we are not yet freed from, have spoil'd most of the Bridges we had laid over the River, so that we must be oblig'd to make them over again. On Thursday last a Detachment of 40 Squadrons, under the Command of Count *Serclaes de Tilly*, was sent towards *Charleroy*, to intercept a Convoy of the Enemies that was going to their Army, but they were pass'd by before the arrival of our Troops, who thereupon return'd to the Camp. Last Night arriv'd here the Earl of *Essex*, and Lieutenant General *Talmahj*; And this Morning the Duke of *Richmond*, Earl of *Marinoath*, and Lord *Colchester*. And my Lord *Dalkeith*, my Lord *Hide*, and Mr. *Carvendish*, are hourly expected from the *Hague*. We hear still great Shooting at *Namur*, where the Belieged behave themselves with great Bravery, and the French have lost a great many Men. On Friday last they Attack a kind of a Spur Work with Pallisadoes, call'd the *Devil's House* near the *Coeborne*, or *William's* Fort, and were repuls'd 4 or 5 times, but at last took it, though it cost them very dear, having lost above 800 Men in that occasion; and we are told, that yesterday they attack the Counter-scarpe of the *Coeborne*, but were beaten off with great loss. These several Repuls's has dishearten'd their Men to that degree, that they are brought on to an Assault with a great deal of difficulty. We are assur'd that Forage is very scarce in the Enemies Camp, they being forced to go 5 and 6 Leagues to fetch it; nor is Bread and other Provisions very plentifully among them. Our Army is in very good Health notwithstanding the unseasonableness of the weather; and the Horse in good Case. Prince *Waldeske's* Indisposition continuing, he is gone this day to *Maestricht*. We are told just now that we shall march to-morrow Morning.

Hague, June 17. We have this day Letters from *Charleroy*, dat'd the 15th instant at 5 in the Morning, which give an account, That the Governor of that place having notice of a Convoy that was going to the French Camp, sent out a Detachment of his Garrison, who having the good Fortune to meet with the Enemy betwixt *Recoix* and *Marienbourg*, seiz'd upon a great many Wagons laden with Provisions and Money, to the value of 600000 Guilders, and having desist'd the French Troops that guard'd them; and that the said Detachment return'd to *Charleroy* with their Booty, and divers Persons just before the Officers came

away; which say farther, That the Castle of *Namur*, and the *New Fort*, being a Work built lately by Colonel *Coeborne*, do make a very vigorous defence, and that the French who had been repuls'd in several Assaults with great loss, have not hitherto made any considerable advance upon them. The 8000 *Lunenburghers* are to begin their march to-morrow towards *Flanders*.

Plimouth, June 7. Yesterday arriv'd here the *Smalton* of *London*, with Wine and Salt from *Lisbon*. And this day Sailed from hence Their Majesties Ship the *Samuel* and *Henry*, with several Merchantmen under her Convoy for *New England*.
