Dover-Alterations in Lights and Buoy.

With reference to Notices to Mariners Nos. 842 and 951 of 1901 and 1239 of 1904:—

Further information, dated 4th January, 1905, has been received from the Trinity House, London, of the undermentioned alterations in lights and buoyage of Dover Harbour:—

1. The position of the temporary lighthouse, to which the white fixed and flashing light has been transferred, is 200 feet from the masonry head of the extended Admiralty Pier, as shown in pecked line on the Chart.

Approximate position, lat. 51° $6\frac{1}{2}'$ N., long. 1° $19\frac{1}{2}'$ E.

- 2. The two red fixed lights, vertical, 6 feet apart, will not be exhibited from the centre of the outer end of the masonry head of the Admiralty Pier extension until the staging used for the extension has been removed. Until the staging has been removed its end will be marked by a red light at each outer corner as before.
- 3. A white occulting light every ten seconds, thus:—light, seven seconds; eclipse, three seconds, has been established on the elbow of the staging of the Southern (not Eastern) breakwater, in a position S. 33° E., distant 9½ cables, from St. Mary's Church, Dover Castle.
