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Rome, June 7.

**T**He Difference still continues between this Court and that of France, about the Bulls for the French Bishops who assisted at the Assembly of 1682, and this hinders Signior *Cavallerini's* departure for Paris, whether he is designed Nuncio. The Popes Gallies are now ready to Sail from *Civita Vecchia*, and have Orders to join those of *Milza*, who expect them at *Messina*, after which they are to proceed towards the *Levant*.

*Genoa, June 7.* On the 5th instant came into this Port 35 French Gallies; The Chevalier *de Nouilles*, who commands them, was Complimented in the Name of the Senate; and it's believed they will Sail again this Evening towards *Marsilles*. The Prince Royal of *Denmark*, who came lately hither from *Rome*, is gone with two Gallies of this Republick to *Antibo*. We have advice, That the *Sieur de Riborette*, with some French Frigats and Gallies, was passed by *Malta* towards *Tripoli*, designing to Bombard that place.

*Venice, June 13.* We hear from *Naples*, That Captain *Saunders*, Commander of the *James*, a Merchant Ship of 32 Guns, arrived there about 10 days ago from the Coast of *Barbary*, where he met, not far from *Argiers*, a French Man of War of 40 Guns, and after an Engagement of 15 hours came off with the loss only of 3 Men killed, and 5 wounded.

*From the Imperial Camp before Great Waradin, June 6.* On the 3d instant arrived in the Camp 400 Wagons laden with Ammunition; That day we shot a great many Bombs into the place, and our Cannon played with very good effect; the Breach was considerably enlarged; and the Night following we continued our Work for filling up the Ditch, together with our other Preparations for an Assault; The 4th towards Noon there came out of the Fortress five Turkish Officers, the two foremost having little white Flags in their Hands, for a sign that they desired a Parley; They were conducted to General *Heister's* Quarters, whom they acquainted with the desire of the Garrison to Capitulate, in case they might have honorable Conditions granted them; and having received an Answer to their Satisfaction, they returned to the Place to give their Principals an account thereof; They came back again presently after, and the going to and fro continued till Night, without any Conclusion, farther than that it was agreed, That all Hostilities should cease: The 5th the Turks presented to General *Heister* Articles of Capitulation, which the chief Officers of the Garrison had agreed on and Signed, and with some little Alterations, they were consented to on our side; They are as follows.

1. That the Garrison shall be conducted to *Pantzoua* near the Danube; and that the Turks of the Palanks or Castles of *Paymera* and *Solmeto* shall have liberty to go with them with all their Baggage. 2. That they shall be safely Conduited to the said Place by the way of *Tekabarou*. 3. Twelve Hundred Wagons, and 200 Horses to be provided for them, and they to have five days time to Sell their Goods, and Buy what they please. 4. No Persons now in

the Place, whether Slaves, or others, who being Christians have turn'd Turks, shall be molested. 5. The Hungarian Rebels that are in the Fortress shall not be stop'd. 6. The Garrison may take with them their Arms and Colours. 7. They may also take with them their Registers and Records. 8. In case any Wagons break, others to be provided in their stead, and their Baggage shall not be Plundered or Spoil'd. 9. Money shall not be required for their Quarters in their march. 10. None of their Women and Children shall be taken from them, and Provisions provided for them at their Charge. 11. The Christians shall make no Protestations of Debt upon them. 12. They shall not be stop'd on their way. 13. The Bridge of the Fortress shall be immediately repaired that the Wagons may march out. 14. In marching out their Baggage shall not be Pillaged. 15. The Turks that Defended the Fortress by Order of the Sultan shall not be molested. 16. All such Strangers as are in the Place shall be at liberty to go where they please.

So soon as the Capitulation was Concluded, 400 Men were detached out of the Camp to take possession of the principal Posts of the Fortress, which General *Heister* went himself this Morning to visit, being met and Complimented by the Aga of the Janisaries, and 15 others of the chief of the Garrison. We are now at Work to repair the Bridge; The Government of the Place is given to Colonel *Selick*; And this Evening all the Germans and Hungarians who were Prisoners with the Turks, are released.

*Vienna, June 15.* The Letters from Great Waradin of the 9th instant, say, That the Turks were marched out of the Place, but still continued in our Camp; That the Imperialists had already begun to repair the Fortifications of the Fortress, and had put into it a good Garrison. The *Marquis de Feury*, is very busie in fitting out his Fleet of Barks and Gallies which will be ready to serve by the end of this Month.

*Hydberg, June 21.* The Imperial and Federate Forces are drawing together about *Switzim*, where there are now encamped 18 Regiments, under the Command of the *Marquis de Bareith*, Velt Marshall General: 'Tis said that a strong Detachment will be sent from thence the next Week to join the Troops of *Hesse*, who lie near *Mentz*. We are told likewise that the Forces of *Saxony* do assemble near *Rosshenburg* on the *Tsaber*, and that they have Orders to march to the *Rhine*.

*Francfort, June 22.* Yesterday passed through this City 3 Swedish Regiments, two of Foot and one of Horse, in their march towards the *Bergstrae*. The french continue encamped at *Neder Ulm*, near *Mentz*.

*Cologne, June 24.* The Deputies that went lately from our Elector, and the Elector *Palatin*, to the Bishop of *Munster*, are come back; and 'tis said, That the Troops that Bishop is to send towards the *Rhine* are preparing for their march. The Forces of *Neuburg* and *Cologne* are still encamped near *Zulpich*.

*Paris, June 23.* The Arribans of *Normandy* that were sent home some time ago, are now called together again & have Orders to take the Parts of the Troops lately encamp'd on that Coast, who are separated in order to be employed elsewhere. The late King *James* came on the 21st of this Month
