PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1857, it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appears to His Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Local Board of Health of any district established under the Public Health Act, or upon the petition of any Commissioners elected by the ratepayers, and acting under or by virtue of the powers of any Local Act of Parliament for the improvement of any town, parish, or borough, stating that the district of such Local Board of Health or of such Commissioners is co-extensive with a district for which it is proposed to provide a burial-ground, and that no Burial Board has been appointed for such district, and that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial-grounds within the said district, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, with the advice of His Privy Council, in case His Majesty see fit so to do, to order that such Local Board shall be a Burial Board for the district of such Local Board, or that such Commissioners shall be a Burial Board for the district of such Commissioners, and thereupon such Local Board or such Commissioners, as the case may be, shall be a Burial Board for such district accordingly, and the powers and provisions of the Acts thereinbefore mentioned (except the provisions relating to the constitution or appointment and resignation of members of Burial Boards), and the provisions therein contained, shall extend to the district of such Board and to such Board, or to the district of such Commissioners and to such Commissioners, and to any burial-ground and places for the reception of the bodies of the dead previously to interment which may be provided by such Board or by such Commissioners, in like manner as to any parish or parishes, and the Burial Board thereof and any burial-ground and any such places as aforesaid

provided by such last-mentioned Board; save that no approval, sanction, or authorization of any vestry shall be requisite; Provided always, that notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in the district of such Local Board or of such Commissioners, one month at least before such petition is so considered:

And whereas by the Local Government Act, 1894, Urban Sanitary Authorities became Urban District Councils, and their Districts Urban Districts:

And whereas the Urban District Council of Beaconsfield presented a petition to His Majesty in Council, stating that the district of the said Council is co-extensive with the district for which it is proposed to provide a burial-ground, that no Burial Board has been appointed for such district, and that an Order in Council was made on the seventh day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, for closing, for burials, the Parish Church of Beaconsfield and the old part of the churchyard, and the Congregational Chapel and chapelyard at Beaconsfield, and praying that His Majesty would order that the said Urban District Council should be a Burial Board for the Urban District of such Council:

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when His Majesty was pleased to order the same to be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, has been duly published as required by the said first recited Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Urban District Council for the Urban District of Beaconsfield shall be a Burial Board for such Urban District, in accordance with the provisions of the Burial Act, 1857.
