

# The London Gazette.

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Leighorne, June 16.

**W**E have advice from *Argiers*, That the Bashaw of that Place, who lately fled from thence, and was brought back again by order of the Dey, was Strangled soon after his return, having first received 600 Hoas; He was a Pensioner of France, and Committed to have received 18000 Pieces of Eight at several times for promoting the French Interests.

*Milan, June 17.* The Governor of the Milanze has been lately here, and after having had several Conferences with our Duke, is returned to *Milan* to hasten the march of the rest of the Forces of that State. The German Troops, with those of his Royal Highness, are arrived in the Camp near *Vigor*, whither the Duke himself will be going in 2 or 3 days. In the mean time our Parties make frequent Excursions towards *Pignoral*, and return for the most part with good Booty.

*Milan, June 18.* Our Governor has since his return from *Piedmont* taken a Review near *Novarre* of the Spanish Forces, which are on their march to joyn with those of the Duke of *Savoy*, so that the Campaign will now quickly be opened on this side.

*Venice, June 20.* The Count de *Trautmansdorf*, Lieutenant General of the Forces of this Republick, parted from hence on Tuesday last for the *Levant*. The Letters from *Dahavia* advise That the Christians of *Bilao*, who were under the Subjection of the Turks, being desirous to be freed from the same, and to put themselves under the Protection of the Republick, had to that purpose made application to Signior *D. J. M. Provveditore General* of *Dalmatia*, who, after having agreed upon the means and time for executing this design, sent a strong Party of Morliques, and other Troops to assist the People in order to retire into the Venetian Territories; These arriving in the Night near the Town of *Bilao*, easily surprised it, and afterwards attackt the Tower or Castle, which was valiantly defended, but at last taken, 80 Turks, with their Commandant, being killed, and 200 made Slaves, among whom were 100 Men capable to bear Arms, with their Goods and Cattle, into the Dominions of the Republick, where Lands are given them, and some allowance of Money and Corn to the Chief of them.

*Vienna, June 22.* The Velt Marshal *Caprara* parted from hence on Thursday last for *Piedmont*, where he is to Command the Emperors Forces this Campaign. We hear from *Transylvania*, That our Troops quartered in that Principality were on their march towards *Clansburg*, where they expected farther Orders, and that General *Veterani* was making Preparations for the attacking of *Jena*. The last Advices from *Turkey*, say That the new Grand Viceri intended to part from *Alexandria* about the 20th of this Month towards *Sophia*, where he had appointed the Rendezvous of the Ottoman Army. The Turks work very hard at *Belgrade* to repair part of the Wall which is lately fallen down.

*Hanover, June 20.* The Dukes of *Lunenburg* have shewed their Affection to Their Majesties of Great Britain, and the part they take in the happy Success of the Peace, by causing the Cannon to be fired in all their Fortresses, and other publick shewes of Joy to be expressed through all their Dominions for the late glorious Victory over the French at sea. And on this occasion Sir *William Dutton* Chief Their Majesties Envoy Extraordinary, Enter-

tained the Duke and Dukes of *Hanover*, the Princess and young Prince, with all their Court, at a Magnificent Supper; after which the Company and the whole Town were diverted with very fine Fireworks, and Wine running in the streets; And the Solemnity concluded with a Ball, at which their Highnesses were present the greatest part of the Night.

*Hydelberg, June 28.* The Duke of *Wartenburg*, the Marquis de *Baveth*, and the Count de *Strum*, who went some days ago to meet and Confer with the Landgrave of *Hesse* at *Dieburg*, returned thither yesterday Morning, and in the Afternoon went to the Camp at *Smitzheim*. In the Evening marched from hence the Regiment of *Schoonbecker*, as that of *Joyer* did two days before, to joyn with several others, who lie at present at *Ladenburg* on the *Neckar*, and are to march from thence towards *Mentz*; And to morrow the Count de *Strum* marches likewise that way with 3 Regiments of Horse.

*Mentz, June 28.* We had a Report two days ago, That the French Army, Commanded by the Marshal de *Lorge* was marched from *Neder Uim*, but as we understand since, 'twas only a Detachment that was sent out, for their whole Army decamped not till last Night, taking their march towards *Creutznac*; As they passed by this City there happened several Skirmishes between the Troops of their Rearguard, and the Hussars and Dragoons of this Garrison that went out in Parties; who have brought in here divers Prisoners.

*Frankfort, June 29.* The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel*, after having assisted at several Councils of War which were held with the Imperial Generals at *Dieburg*, about 3 miles from hence, is gone back to his Forces, who are now encamped at *Hagen*, between this City and *Mentz*, and will pass the *Rhine* so soon as the Regiments that are coming from the Palatinate, under the Command of the Count de *Strum* have joyned them. The other Body of the Confederate Forces which is now encamped at *Smitzheim* is to be Commanded by the Marquis de *Baveth*, and is to remain on this side the *Rhine* to hinder the Enemy from passing it, (as they did the last year) while the Landgrave of *Hesse* acts on the other. The 3000 Swedes lie still in this Neighbourhood; 'Tis said that they are to march to the Camp at *Smitzheim*.

*Cologne, July 1.* The Elector *Palatin* went on Thursday last to his Camp near *Zulpich*. The day before the Count de *Vehlen* marched from thence with 100 Horse; and defeated a French Party, who had burnt 2 Villages near *Lernich*, of whom they killed about 60, and took 30 Prisoners, with the Officer that Commanded them, a Lieutenant and a Cornet, and about 80 Horses, and recovered all the Booty which they had plundered from the Country. The Marquis de *Joyeuse* decamped some days ago from *Hildshem*, and lies now with the French Troops under his Command at *Muster Eyff* about 6 hours from *Zulpich*. We hear from the *Palatinate*, that the Count de *Strum* was on his march with 11 Regiments to joyn the Forces of *Hesse*, who were encamped near *Hachen*; and that they were laying a Bridge over the *Rhine* at *Manheim*. The Marquis de *Baveth* lies at the same time with a good Body of the Confederate Forces at *Smitzheim* to observe the Enemy on that side.

*Hamburg, July 1.* The Fifth that lately landed here are marched towards *Mecklenburg*, and are to be mustered to march near *Bergsdorf* by the Emperors Commissary, and after that to proceed on their march towards *Hannoy*.

*Paris, June 30.* The Letters from our Camp before *Nismes* of the 28th instant say, That they had raised Batteries in the New Fort for 36 pieces of Cannon and 20 Mortars, which began to play upon the Castle the 27th in the Morning, and to ruin the Differences of the old Horn Work called *Terris Noues*; and that 14 Companies of Grenadiers detach'd out of the several Regiments, supported by 7 Battalions of Foot, were order'd to make an Assault upon the Counterscarp the 28th in the Afternoon, which was after these Letters came away. From *Piedmont* they write, That the Duke of *Savoie* was come to his Camp at *Vigon*; That his great Train of Artillery was daily expected there, and that 'twas his belief he would Besiege or Bombard *Pignerol*. The Prince Royal of *Denmark* is arriv'd at *Mantua* with 30000 Men belonging to the Republick of *Genova*, who are since gone home again. We have an account by the last Letters from *Compedio*, That the *Sieur Agnassin* Lieutenant of *Langueuec* had the 10th day before Condemn'd 4 Persons for having been found at some Religious Assemblies, and that two of them were Hanged, and the other two sent to the Gallies. The same Letters add, That a great number of other Persons have been lately Executed and Condemn'd to the Gallies, and many Families ruined and dispers'd for having frequented private Meetings for the Exercise of their Religion. The Irish Troops that were encamp'd on the Coast of *Normandy* are dispers'd, part of them being sent towards *Lorraine*, part towards *Piedmont*, and the rest towards *Catalonia*.

*From His Majesties Camp at Mele, July 3.* The Castle of *Nismes* Capitulated on Monday last, and the Garrison march'd out the next day with their Arms, Baggage, Colours flying, 6 pieces of Cannon, and 2 Mortars; The Spanish and Dutch Troops being to go by the direct way to *Louvain*, and the Germans to *Maastricht*. The French Army was all pass'd the 3rd before yesterday Morning early, having began to decamp the Night before; and they lie now between *Fosse* and *Gerpens*. 'Tis said, that the French King left the Army on Tuesday to return to *Verfardes*. *Prince Malick* came hither last Night being recovered of his late Illness.

*Hague, July 4.* The Advices from *Nismes* tell us, That on the 28th past the French lodg'd themselves on the Counterscarp of the Old Hornwork that covers the Castle; and that their Batteries from the New Fort had made a considerable Breach; That on the 30th the Besieged Capitulated, and that on the 1st instant the Garrison march'd out, part to *Louvain* and part to *Maastricht*, taking with them 6 pieces of Cannon. The Forces of *Holland* have pass'd the *Meuse* at *P. n. o.* and are on their march to join our Army. The States of *Holland*, who adjourn'd lately, meet again on Tuesday next.

*Wimborch, June 25.* On Thursday last came in here Captain *William Helman*, Commander of the *William and Mary* Privateer, from the Coast of *France*, who gives an account, That he was in Company of 4 English and 4 Dutch Frigats, Commanded by Captain *Mees*, who was sent by Admiral *Russel* to *St. Malo*; That on the 19th instant they stood in towards that Port, and saw 18 French Men of War lying in the Range, and 8 more nearer to the Town; That the Enemy fired upon our Ships from the Fort, but without doing them any Damage; That Captain *Mees* sent back the Experiment to Admiral *Russel*, and came to an Anchor with the rest of the Ships under his Command, about 2 Leagues North of Cape *Frisle*. Captain *Helman* in his return met with 2 Dances that were going from *Hague de Grace* to *St. Martins*, whom he hath brought in here; They say, That a French Ship of 70 Guns, who came in after the Fight has broke her Back at *Hague de Grace*.

*Plimouth, June 26.* We have advice, That the *Geyron* and *Wild Prize* have lately forced
