Hull, July 11.
A Ailed lately bence, three thips of this place, intending for Holland. Two French thips homewards bound, and one for Bergen, laden with the Commodities of the e parts; in their places are arrived three Mips from the Eastern parts, laden with Flax, Pitch, Tarre and Iron.

Lime, June 13. One vessel arriving from St. Maloes, and two from crayfick, bring little news, but only that by reason of the late disbanding of the French soldiers, the ways are very unsafe for Passengers, to the great trouble and usia vantage of those ports, but its said, some speedy

courle will be taken to remedy these disorders.

Hambourgh, July 13. A confiderable party of the Swedish Horse are lately drawn together, and are marching towards Staad, intending, as is supposed, to attend the Corps of lately decealed Count Dhous to its Funeral. The Body is at present at Bremen, where is also the Countels of Dhona, Wife to the decealed.

From Stockholme we are told by Letters bearing date the 3d instant, that the States of the Kingdome were affembled with much Ceremony, at whole fir A Meeting, the Chan-cellour of that Crown, in presence, and in the name of the King and the Queen Regent, in a long Speech gave them a full Account of the State of Affairs in that Kingdome fince their last Assembly 5 withall offering Three I hings to their Consideration 2 First, To pay off all the Lebts of the Crown and fatishe the Merchants for what Moneys they have disburfed upon the Publick Account. Secondly, To give Orders for the speedy levying of 20000 Men. And Thirdly, To find our some convenient Method of raising Moneys to defray their necessary Expences.

They further tell us that the Heer de Grost, Ambassadour from the States of the United Provinces, has been civilly neated and complemented upon his arrival there, but has not

yetmade his Publick Entry.

The Princes of the Rhine are by their Deputies confu ting at Gologne about the fettlement of those parts of the Empire. 'Tis said the Prince Elector Palatine has' by the Emperours Order besieged Homburg, formerly engaged to the Duke of Lerraine by the Duke of Nassaw for the sum of 280 Thousand Rixdollers; he having resuled to surrender it

upon tender of the Moneys.

A Letter lately sent from the Baron de Rieffenburg (a -prisoner, by the command of the Elector of Majente) to the Elector Palatine, was by some accident opened by the way in the Territories of the faid Elector of Mayence, which the Blector Palarine ill refenting, was pleased to dispatch some persons of Quality to Mayence, to make inquiry after the persons, guilty of the affront, and to require farisfaction by their due punishment; but the Elector of Mayence has returned them again well satisfied, assuring his Highness the Elector Palatine, that he is so far from any intentions of violating the good understanding that hathbeen setled between them ; that he shall be ready with his forces to oppole all such as shall any ways endeavor to disturb the

There are great preparations made in the Palatinate, and the Mi itis forces both of Horle and Foot, are summon'd to be in readinaly as not well understanding the intentions of the Lorainers in their late Leavies, and the Garrison they have lately drawn in the Castle of Honeck.

His Highness the Elector Palatine has by his Proclamation, and other publick Papers, declared his resolution to

maintain and vindicate all his Right and Title given him by the peace of Munfler, the Conventions at Novemberg, and the late sentence of Arbitration given at Hailbrun.

Rome, June 30. On Sunday last Prince Colonno Con-Stable of the Kingdome of Naples; made a publick Visit to the Spanish Ambailadour, who received him with much Livility, but by the Queen Regents Command took the hand of the Contrable, though in his own Pallace.

On Tuelday last was celebrated the Anniversary for the Creation of His Holiness, and the next day was solemnly fung Te Deum in the Church of St. Louis, for the Peace establish between the Two Crowns, and that Evening frent by the French Amballadour with extraordinary Fire-

works and other Divertilements.

On Thursday being Sr. Peters day, the Spanish Ambassadur attended by a nume.ous Train of I itular f rinces and Roman Nobility, with many Prelates; and all the Feudataries of His Catholick Majefty, which were to be found in this City, made a Solemn Cavalcade to the Vatican, where he presented the Pope with the accustomed Present of a White Hackney, and a Cedule of 7000 Ducats, as a Tribute for the Kingdome of Naples 3 and afterwards with a rich Litter, and some Mules richly clothed and adorned with the Popes Arms, as a Present from the Viceroy.

Genoua, June 30, From the lile of Gorfica we are told of the arrival there of a French ship dispatched lately from Thousen, with a Command to find out the French Fleet and to carry Orders to them enjoyning them to return again into their Ports in Provence, and to cease any farther Acts of

Hokility against the Spaniards.

From Milan we are told that the present Governour has been present at several Musters of the Forces under his Gove.nment, but as yet no Orders are given for the dishaiflion of any part of them, till the arrival of the Marquis de Mortara, who is preparing for his departure from Madride and may possibly arrive here by the end of July, to take upon him the Government of this State.

Vienna, July 1. The Courier sent by His Imperial Majefly into Swedeland, is again returned, bringing with him the Treaty of a League lately concluded by the Sieur Bafferode, his Resident in that Court, between the Empe-

rour and King of sweden:

Great complaints are daily brought hither from Hungary, of the frequent violencies committed by the Hullars in leveral irroads made by them upon their Quarters, to which the Emperour is fully refolved to give a speedy remedy by the severe punishment of the principal Offenders; that the Turks may receive full Leisfaction for the injuries done them, and to take such care for the fliture, that a restraint if all be put upon those people, to the end that no Just occafion may be given on this fide for the breach of the peace.

Some few days Ance, the Sieur Pignatelli, the Popel Nuncio was with the ulual Ceremonies conducted to his Audience from the Emprels Eleanor, and on Sunday following, with much folemnity, performed the Ceremony of Confirmation to the two Arch-Dutcheffes in the Chap-

pel of the Pallace.
