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Hull, July 11.

SAILED lately hence, three Ships of this place, intending for *Holland*. Two French Ships homewards bound, and one for *Bergen*, laden with the Commodities of the e parts; in their places are arrived three Ships from the Eastern parts, laden with Flax, Pitch, Tarre and Iron.

Lima, June 13. One vessel arriving from *St. Maloes*, and two from *Crossick*, bring little news, but only that by reason of the late disbanding of the French soldiers, the ways are very unsafe for Passengers, to the great trouble and disa vantage of those parts, but 'tis said, some speedy course will be taken to remedy these disorders.

Hambourgh, July 13. A considerable party of the Swedish Horie are lately drawn together, and are marching towards *Staad*, intending, as is supposed, to attend the Corps of lately deceased Count *Dhona* to its Funeral. The Body is at present at *Bremen*, where is also the Countess of *Dhona*, Wife to the deceased.

From *Stockholme* we are told by Letters bearing date the 30 instant, that the States of the Kingdome were assembled with much Ceremony, at whose first Meeting, the Chancery of that Crown, in presence, and in the name of the King and the Queen Regent, in a long Speech gave them a full Account of the State of Affairs in that Kingdome since their last Assembly; withall offering Three Things to their Consideration: First, To pay off all the Debts of the Crown, and satisfy the Merchants for what Moneys they have disbursed upon the Publick Account. Secondly, To give Orders for the speedy levying of 10000 Men. And Thirdly, To find out some convenient Method of raising Moneys to defray these necessary Expences.

They farther tell us that the Heer *de Groot*, Ambassadour from the States of the *United Provinces*, has been civilly treated and complemented upon his arrival there, but has not yet made his Publick Entry.

The Princes of the *Rhine* are by their Deputies consulting at *Cologne* about the settlement of those parts of the Empire. 'Tis said the Prince Elector *Palatine* has by the Emperours Order besieged *Homburg*, formerly engaged to the Duke of *Lorraine* by the Duke of *Nassaw* for the sum of 280 Thousand Rixdollers; he having refused to surrender it upon tender of the Moneys.

A Letter lately sent from the Baron *de Kieffenburg* (a prisoner, by the command of the Elector of *Mayence*) to the Elector *Palatine*, was by some accident opened by the way in the Territories of the said Elector of *Mayence*, which the Elector *Palatine* ill resenting, was pleased to dispatch some persons of Quality to *Mayence*, to make inquiry after the persons, guilty of the affront, and to require satisfaction by their due punishment; but the Elector of *Mayence* has returned them again well satisfied, assuring his Highness the Elector *Palatine*, that he is so far from any intentions of violating the good understanding that hath been scled between them; that he shall be ready with his forces to oppose all such as shall any ways endeavor to disturb the peace.

There are great preparations made in the *Palatinate*, and the *Mixia* forces both of Horie and Foot, are summoned to be increaded, as not well understanding the intentions of the *Lorrainers* in their late Levies, and the *Garrison* they have lately drawn in the Castle of *Honeck*.

His Highness the Elector *Palatine* has by his Proclamations, and other publick Papers, declared his resolution to

maintain and vindicate all his Right and Title given him by the peace of *Munster*, the Conventions at *Noremberg*, and the late sentence of Arbitration given at *Hailbrun*.

Rome, June 30. On Sunday last Prince *Colonno* Constable of the Kingdome of *Naples*; made a publick Visit to the Spanish Ambassadour, who received him with much civility, but by the Queen Regents Command took the hand of the Constable, though in his own Pallace.

On Tuesday last was celebrated the Anniversary for the Creation of His Holiness, and the next day was solemnly sung *Te Deum* in the Church of *St. Louis*, for the Peace establishd between the Two Crowns, and that Evening spent by the French Ambassadour with extraordinary Fireworks and other Diversions.

On Thursday being *St. Peters* day, the Spanish Ambassadour attended by a numerous Train of Italian Princes and Roman Nobility, with many Prelates, and all the Feudatories of His Catholick Majesty, which were to be found in this City, made a solemn Cavalcade to the *Vatican*, where he presented the Pope with the accustomed Present of a White Hackney, and a Cedula of 7000 Ducats, as a Tribute for the Kingdome of *Naples*; and afterwards with a rich Litter, and some Mules richly clothed and adorned with the Popes Arms, as a Present from the Viceroy.

Genova, June 30. From the Isle of *Gorfica* we are told of the arrival there of a French ship dispatched lately from *Thoulon*, with a Command to find out the French Fleet, and to carry Orders to them enjoying them to return again into their Ports in *Provence*, and to cease any farther Acts of Hostility against the Spaniards.

From *Milan* we are told that the present Governour has been present at several Musters of the Forces under his Government, but as yet no Orders are given for the dismissal of any part of them, till the arrival of the Marquis *de Mortara*, who is preparing for his departure from *Madrid*, and may possibly arrive here by the end of *July*, to take up on him the Government of this State.

Vienna, July 1. The Courier sent by His Imperial Majesty into *Sweden*, is again returned, bringing with him the Treaty of a League lately concluded by the Sieur *Bassforde*, his Resident in that Court, between the Emperour and King of *Sweden*.

Great complaints are daily brought hither from *Hungary*, of the frequent violencies committed by the Huslars in several roads made by them upon their Quarters, to which the Emperour is fully resolved to give a speedy remedy by the severe punishment of the principal Offenders; that the Turks may receive full satisfaction for the injuries done them, and to take such care for the future, that a restraint shall be put upon those people, so the end that no just occasion may be given on this side for the breach of the peace.

Some few days since, the Sieur *Pignatelli*, the Popes Nuncio was with the usual Ceremonies conducted to his Audience from the Empress *Eleanor*, and on Sunday following, with much solemnity, performed the Ceremony of Confirmation to the two Arch-Duchesses in the Chapel of the Pallace.

We have advice from *Raab*, that some publick Turkish Minister with a train of sixty persons, was on his way hither, being sent (as 'tis said) from the Grand Signior, to negotiate in some affairs relating both to the Crown of *Poland* and his Wars with the Republick of *Venice*.
