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Rome, June 14.

THe Cardinals *d'Estree* and *de Fourbin* do earnestly press the Pope to cause his Bulls to be dispatched for the rest of the French Bishops, and do declare, That till this Matter be finished, Signior *Cavallerini*, who is designed Nuncio to France, and has already begun his Visits of Leave in order to his Departure, will not be received at the French Court. The Pope has ordered the Minutes of a Bull, which he has resolved to publish for moderating the Privileges to which the Popes Nephews do pretend, to be communicated to all the Cardinals here; The main Points whereof are, the suppressing of all Military and Civil Offices which they have heretofore enjoyed; and the limiting the Ecclesiastical Revenues to be given to such of them as are Cardinals; but many of the Cardinals do dislike this Bull. The ill weather has retarded the departure of the Popes Gallies which are still at *Civita Vecchia*.

Turin, June 21. The Duke of Savoy went the last Week to his Camp near *Vigon*, and took a review of the Forces there; after which his Royal Highness returned hither to give farther Orders about the Preparations for the Campagne. The great Train of Artillery will march from hence in two or three days; Yesterday it was joined by several new Cannon from *Ivrée*, and we are told that in all it will amount to above 100 pieces. The Troops of the Milaneze are to be this day at their Rendezvous in order to their march hither. The Discourse of a Design upon *Pignerol* still continues, though there seems to be some Reason to believe from the Duke's having ordered every Community in this Country to furnish a number of Mules, which in all will make above 3000, that his Royal Highness has thoughts of passing the Mountains, and marching directly into *Dauphine*. Monsieur *Catinat* lies all this while with a small Body of Men between *Susa* and *Pignerol*, expecting Reinforcements from *Provence*, *Languedoc*, and *Dauphine*.

Milan, June 18. Our Governor, the Marquis *de Legnèze*, goes Com hence to morrow to take a Review of the Forces of this State, who have their Rendezvous between *Berghero* and *Ferceil*; after which they will march with a good Train of Artillery,

and a great quantity of Ammunition and Bombs, towards *Piedmont*. The Troops of Savoy are encamped near *Panca'ier*, and the Imperial Forces near *Vigone*, from whence they make frequent Incurfions towards *Pignerol*. The Signior *de Catinat* continues in the mean time to fortifie the Poits which he has possessed himself of between *Susa* and *Pignerol*, in order to preserve not only the Communication between those Places, but likewise with *Dauphine* and *Provence*.

Venice, June 20. By Letters from *Malta* of the 25th past, we are told, That several French Men of War and Gallies were arrived in that Harbour, who were going to Bombard *Tripoli*. The Gallies of *Malta* were ready to put to Sea, with Orders to expect the Popes Gallies at *Messina*, and then to proceed together towards the *Levant*. By a Vessel from the *Morea* we have advice, That the Captain General *Morosini* designed to Sail with the Fleet of this State to the *Archipelago*, and to Cruize there till such time as the Army is ready to take the Field.

Vienna, June 26. The Auxiliary Troops of *Munster*, to the number of about 4000 Men, passed by this place 2 days ago in their march towards *Hungary*. The General Rendezvous of the Imperial Forces that are to compose the main Army, is appointed near *Essecke*. Those in *Transilvania* are likewise drawing together under the Command of General *Veterani*, and being joyned with the Troops that were employed in the Reduction of *Great Waradin*, will it's believed attack *Jeno* and *Giula*, the only Places of any strength which the Turks remain Matters of on that side. Prince *Eugene* of Savoy parted from hence yesterday towards *Piedmont*.

Hydelberg, July 1. On the 30th past three Imperial Regiments of Horse passed the *Neckar* to join with those that are encamped at *Ladenburg*, and have Orders to march towards *Mentz*. The three Suedish Regiments are come on this side of the *Neckar*, and are going to joyn the Confederate Forces at *Wiseloch*. The French have not yet Reinforced the Garrison of *Philipsburg*, as was lately Reported; and some Deserters that are come from thence, say, That there are not at present above 7 or 800 Soldiers in that place.
