Turin, June 28.

THE Marquis de Leganez, Governor of Milan, arrived here on the 23d instant, and the Spanish Troops, to the number of 10000 Foot and 2000 Horse, encamped last night near a place called *Sette*, about three Leagues from hence, and are expected here this evening: They bring with them 40 Pieces of Cannon, 10000 Bombs, and 40000 Cannon-shot, with great quantities of Provisions. His Royal Highness intends to go to the Camp on Monday next, and the great Train of Artillery will follow with all expedition: 'Tis still believed that he designs to besiege *Pignerol*, and block up *Casal*. The Vaudois made this week an Incurſion almost to the Walls of *Pignerol*, where they thought to have seized upon some Cattle, but they found them all within the Pallisadoes: In their return, they met a French Party, of whom they killed 22, and got some Booty.

Warsaw, June 28. The Forces of this Crown and the Great Dutchy of *Lithuania* are marching to the general Rendezvous, which is appointed near *Lemburg*: but it will be towards the end of this month before the Army can take the Field; The King continues his Resolution to command it in Person. The Governor of *Siroete* has given the Court an Account, That he has repulsed the Tartars in two Assaults they made upon that place, with the slaughter of a great number of them.

Vienna, July 3. My Lord Ambassador *Harbord* parted from hence the first instant, and arrived the next day at *Presbourg* on his way towards *Belgrade*. Prince *Louis* of *Baden* will set out in few days for *Hungary*; and in the mean time here are held frequent Councils of War, to concert the Designs of the Campaign. By the last Letters from the Frontiers, we are told, That 12 Imperial Regiments were already encamped near *Esseck*; and that the rest of the Forces, who are to compose the Main Army, were shortly expected at the Rendezvous. Twelve Thousand men are on their march thither from *Great Waradin*, having left in that Fortrefs a Garison of 2000 men. The Imperial Troops that lately quitted the Pass of *Pescabara* are arrived in *Transylvania*, and the Turkish Garison of *Great Waradin* has been thereupon permitted to march towards *Gols*. From *Croatia* we hear, That the Commandant of *Noui* had on the 17th of the last month, with 300 men, attack'd and taken *Bibacz*, which he plundered, and brought back a good Booty, with divers Prisoners. General *Veterani* continues with the Troops under his Command near the *Iron-Gate*. The Advices from *Turky* say, That the Ottoman Troops were drawing together about *Nissa*, and that the Visier would be at *Belgrade* about the end of this month.

Francfort, July 9. By Letters from the Confederate Army commanded by the Landgrave of *Hesse*, of the 7th instant, we have an Account, That on the 4th they broke up from near *Mentz*, and marched to *Guntersblum*, where they encamped; and the Landgrave receiving Advice that 300 French were posted at *Wormes*, he sent thither a Detachment of Dragoons; who, being come to the place, by a Trumpeter summoned the Enemy to yield at discretion: but they not knowing that the German Army had passed the *Rhine*, and was so near them, answered, *That they were in a posture to defend themselves*; whereupon 1000 Dragoons, commanded by the Count de *Leiningen*, were ordered to attack the Enemy, who had strongly posted themselves in a Church; and after a sharp Dispute, which lasted several hours, the Germans broke in upon them, and put them all to the Sword, except their Commandant and some few Officers: On our side about 40 were killed, and 60 wounded in this Action; which was hardly ended, when five Squadrons of French Horse appeared to relieve their Men: but the Imperial Hussars falling upon them, killed 160, and put the rest to flight. On the 5th the German Army advanced nearer to *Wormes*; And that evening our Hussars fell upon some of the Enemies Baggage, cut off 50 Men, and brought into the Camp 40 Prisoners, with 20 laden Wagons. On the 6th the Landgrave marched again, and advanced towards the French Army, who 'twas reported was moving towards him. A Party of our Hussars advancing within Cannon-shot of the Enemies Camp, were engaged by a strong Body of their Troops: but they made good their Retreat, having lost about 80 Men, and some Officers. In the mean time, the Landgrave continued his march, and the two Armies came so near each other, that their Cannon began to play on both sides, and they stood in Battalia within half an hours march of each other, but with a River between them, till Two in the afternoon, when the French drew off towards *Heppenheim*, and the Germans returned to their Camp near *Wormes*. The Confederate Forces that lie on this side the *Rhine*, under the Command of the Margrave of *Bareith*, have laid a Bridge over the same, in order to their conjunction with the Landgrave of *Hesse*, who has sent the General Count de *Thungen* to hasten their march.

Heydelburg, July 8. The Confederate Forces commanded by the Margrave of *Bareith*, marched yesterday from *Wiseloch* to *Schwetzingen*, and this morning to *Seekingen* on the *Necker*, over which they have laid a Bridge; and 5 Regiments of Foot and one of Dragoons are detached, with Orders to pass the *Rhine* over the Bridge at *Sandhofen*, and joyn the Landgrave of *Hesse*. General *Thungen* arrived this day at *Ladenburg*.

Cologne, July 11. The Letters from the Upper *Rhine* advise, That a Party of Germans had cut off 300 French that were posted at *Wormes*, and routed 5 Squadrons of Horse that came to their Relief: But that another Party of Hussars advancing too far, fell in with a great Body of the Enemies Troops, being part of their Left Wing, and lost about 80 men, the rest retiring in good Order. The Landgrave of *Hesse* lay encamped by our last Advice near *Wormes*, between *Pfetersheim* and *Heppenheim*, within a German mile of the French Army. Monsieur de *Joveuse*, with the French Troops that

lay lately under his Command in the *Essele*, is marched towards the *Moselle*. The Forces of the Elector Palatine and *Cologne* are going to encamp between *Juliers* and *Daren*.

Hamburgh, July 11. The Velt-Marshal *Schoning*, who was seized on the 3d instant, by the Emperor's Order, at the Baths near *Diplutz*, is carried Prisoner into *Miravia*: They say he is accused of holding Correspondencies with the French, and discovering to them several private Transactions between the Emperor and the Court of *Saxony*. From *Copenhagen* we have an Account, That the King of *Denmark* would in few days begin his Journey to *Holstein*, to view the New Fortifications at *Rkensburg*.

Paris, July 11. The last Letters from *Pignerol* tell us, That the Duke of *Savoy* had taken a general Review of his Army; but that his heavy Cannon was still at *Thion*: and that it was believed his Royal Highness designed, before he began the Siege of *Pignerol*, to possess himself of a very advantageous Post, called *St. Brigitte*, where Monsieur *Catinat* (who was encamped at *Pillars*, but is from that place) had placed two Battalions to defend it. They write from *Pepignau* of the first instant; That the Duke de *Naailles* lay encamped near the *Lampourdan*; and that the Spanish Army was marching, with a design, as 'twas thought, to enter into *Rouillon*. The Count de *Tourville* came hither two days ago from *St. Malo*. They have taken up part of the Cannon of the Ships burnt lately by the Enemy at *Cherbourg* and *La Hague*; but very few of them are fit for Service. We have had continual and excessive Rains in these parts for six weeks together, which has done much harm in the Country.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Genap*, July 14. Yesterday 10 Battalions of Foot and 5 Regiments of Horse were detached from hence, under the Command of the Count de *Horne*, General of the Artillery, towards *Flanders*, as well for re-inforcing the Garisons, as for securing some Posts on that side. The Hanouer Troops are encamped about *Dieff*, expecting His Majesty's Orders to march. The Duke of *Luxemburg* lies at *Soignies*, and the Marquis de *Boufflers* with the Troops under his Command about *Ettines*.

Hague, July 15. The States of *Holland* have laid another Tax of the One hundredth Penny of every man's Estate in this Province. Some Deputies are come hither from the States of *Zealand*, to confer with those of *Holland* and the other Provinces, upon the Complaints made by the Envoys of *Sweden* and *Denmark* concerning some Ships that have been brought in by the Dutch Privateers. We have an Account from *Hanouer*, That my Lord *Paget*, Their Majesties Envoy Extraordinary at the Emperor's Court, was arrived there, and intended to continue his Journey on the 11th towards His Majesty's Camp in *Flanders*.

Falmouth, July 9. On the 6th instant arrived here the two *Pacquet-Boats*, the *Spanish Assistance* and the *Spanish Expedition* from the *Groyne*, and brought in with them a French Prize called the *Happy Return* of *Bourdeaux*, laden with Sugars from *Martenico*; as also the *Resolution* of *Bristol*, who was taken by a French Privateer in her Voyage homeward from the *Barbadoes*, and re-taken by one of the said *Pacquet-Boats*. Yesterday came in here a Dutch *Caper* of 10 Guns, with a French Prize, bound home from *Martenico*, whence she came in Company of about 30 Sail, under the Convoy of three *Men of War*; but they had not been six days at Sea, when they were all separated by bad Weather.

Plimouth, July 10. The Fleet, which was standing to the Westward, is forced back by a strong West North-West Wind, to *Torbay*, where they are now at Anchor; and this day sailed from hence several Tenders to joyu them. This day likewise sailed out of this Port Their Majesties Ship the *Cen-*

turion, with the *Henry* and *William* from *Jamaica*, and several other Merchant-men under her Convoy, bound to the Eastward.

Westminster, July 11. This day the Parliament met, and was by Commission again Prorogued to the 22d of *August* next ensuing.
