Rome, July 5.

ON Sunday last the Pope and the whole College of Cardinals assisted at a solemn Mass in St. Peter's Church, for the Taking of Great Waradin. The Tuesday following the Nuncio Cavallerini parted from hence for Civita Vecchia, where he will embark on the Galley that is appointed to carry him to France. The Bull for Suppressing the Nepotism is signed by 35 Cardinals, and even by those who at first opposed it. Three or four Cardinals more are expected here this week; and so soon as they have likewise signed it, the Bull will be published; which every new Cardinal when he receives his Cap is to swear that he will observe to the utmost of his power.

Milan, July 9. The Confederate Forces in Piedmont, who are computed to be above 40000 Men, lay encamped, as we understand by our freshest Advices, very near to Pignerol; and they stay'd only for the arrival of General Caprara, who passed through this place several days ago, to open the Campaign. We are told at the same time, That the resolution is taken to block up Casal; and that the Troops to be employed in this Service are drawing together under the Command of the Marquis de Pianezza.

Venice, July 11. We have Advice, That the Convoy which lately parted from hence, Commanded by Signior Priuli, is arrived at Zant, and has been joined there with several other Vessels bound with Stores to our Fleet. The Pope's Galleys, with those of Malta, have taken their Course towards the Levant; the latter having on Board 1000 Land-Soldiers, and above 100 Knights of that Order. From Dalmatia they write, That the Proveditore-General Desino was gone from Zara to Sing, where he made Preparations for some Enterprize against the Enemy, who are not in a con-

dition to give him any great Opposition, by reason of their having drawn most of their Troops from those parts, to reinforce their Army in Hungary. We hear, That the Tripolins have taken a rich French Ship, called the *Theresia*, together with a Tartane, who were bound from hence to *Alexandria*.

Warsaw, June 30. The Forces of this Kingdom are marching to the place appointed for their Rendezvous; but it will be towards the end of the next month, before they can be formed into a Body. In the mean time, the Train of Artillery is preparing at Lemberg, and the Senators who intend to wait upon the King into the Field, are providing their Equipages. The Tartars continue their Incurfions into the Frontier Provinces, and some of their Parties have brought their Booty to Caminiec, to secure it. 'Tis reported, That the Cham is marched with part of his Troops to joyn the Turkish Army in Hungary; and that he has already passed the Frontiers of Moldavia, in his way thither. The Letters from Moscow tell us, That the Czars had got a great Army together; and that the youngest Czar intended to go himself at the Head of it against the Tartars.

Esseck, July 6. The Imperial Forces are drawing together near this place, where several Regiments are already encamped, and the rest expected in a short time. We work very hard here on our Fortifications, which are almost brought to perfection. We have Advice, That the Turks have at present a Garison of 5 or 6000 Men at Belgrade, and that 12000 Spahi's lay encamped not far from thence; That the chief Rendezvous of the Ottoman Army is to be near Nissa; but that the Troops, especially those from Asia, advanced very slowly: and there is a Report, That the Grand Visier, as he was on his departure from Adrianople to go to the Army, had been stop't by some new Commotion. A Party of Turks appeared lately before the Castle

of *Titul*; but understanding that the Radzians, who are quartered thereabouts, were marching towards them, they retired again.

Vienna, July 13. The seven new Gallies that have been lately built here, will be ready in few days to joyn with those that are fitting at *Raab, Comerra,* and other places on the *Danube*: The *Marquis de Fleury* is to command this Fleet, and proposes to do great Service with it. The *Lunenburg Troops*, who lie near this City to refresh themselves, will continue their March to morrow or the day following towards *Hungary*, whither Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* will be going in 8 or 10 days, to command the Imperial Army, which has its Rendezvous on the *Drave*.

Dublin, July 21. The Lords Justices and Council have caused a Proclamation to be published, to give Notice, That Their Majesties, in tender Compassion to their Subjects of this Kingdom, and in consideration of what they have suffered in the late War, have been graciously pleased to exonerate and discharge them from all Arrears of *Hearth-Money*, and also of and from the *Half-year's Quit-Rent*, which grew due from them at *Lady-day* or *Easter* last, since the War of this Kingdom was declared to be ended.

Falmouth, July 18. The *Clouesley Galley* took one of the *French Privateers* she was engaged with on *Saturday* last; but the biggest of the two, being a Ship of 20 Guns, got away.

Newcastle, July 19. Yesterday and this morning are come into our Harbor above 300 Sail of light *Colliers*, with their Convoy.

Hull, July 20. On *Monday* last came into *Humber* a Dutch Man of War of 50 Guns, to convoy some Ships bound from hence to *Rotterdam*. The same day arrived here the *Mermaid* Frigate, with about 20 Sail of Merchant-men from *London*.

Yarmouth, July 20. This day sailed out of our Road the *African* and *Swift* Men of War, to the Northward. The *King's Fisher* is come in from Cruising: The *Garland* is likewise in this Road, with several of the *Eastland-Fleet*, who wait for a fair Wind.

Yarmouth, July 22. The *Eastland-Fleet*, with their Convoy, sailed from hence yesterday for the River. The *African* and the *Swift*, with the Merchant-men under their Convoy, are this afternoon put back into our Road, the Wind at N. W.

Deale, July 22. Yesterday Their Majesties Ships the *Reserve, Crown, Bonaventure, Sbeerness,* and *Signal Fire-Ship*, sailed out of the *Downes*, with the *New-foundland Fleet*, and several other Merchant Ships; bound to the Westward.

Whitehall, July 23. Their Majesties have been graciously pleased, upon the Death of *Dr. Thomas Wood*, late Bishop of *Litchfield* and *Coventry*, to nominate the Right Reverend Father in God *William* Lord Bishop of *St. Asaph* to be Bishop of that See; and a *Congé d'Eslire* to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of *Litchfield* and *Coventry*, is accordingly passing under the Great Seal, empowering them to proceed to an Election.

The Dutch Mail of last Tuesday is not yet come in.
