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Cadix, June 16.

TWO days ago arrived here an Express from *Madrid*, with Orders to the General of the Spanish Fleet to go up the *Strights* with what Men of War are ready; and accordingly he will sail in few days, and take his Course towards *Catalonia*. The Commerce do now begin to lade on board the Flota bound for *New Spain*, which is ordered to sail from hence about the middle of the next month.

Rome, July 12. Last Monday was held another Consistory, where the four French Churches, Preconised in that held the last week, were Proposed; and the Churches of *Lerone* and *Dole* were Preconised. The Pope received this day the usual Compiments, upon his entering into the second year of his Government.

Genova, July 12. On Thursday last arrived here in one of the Pope's Gallies Signior *Cavallerini*, who is going Nuncio to *France*; and yesterday he parted again for *Marseilles*. By a *Felucca*, who is come in seven days from *Marseilles*, we are told, That the French Gallies designed to have sailed from thence on the 29th past to the Westward, but were hindered by the contrary Winds. From *Barcelona* we hear, That the Spanish Gallies would joy in few days with those of *Naples* and *Sicily*, and the Duke of *Turki's* Squadron. The Infection being wholly ceased in *Naples*, this day was published here a free Commerce with that Kingdom.

Turin, July 12. Yesterday marched from hence to our Camp 14 Pieces of Cannon, with as many Wagons laden with Ammunition; and 'tis said the rest of the Artillery will follow this day or to morrow. The Troops who have had their Quarters in the Valley of *Aoste*, are ordered to march this way, and are expected here in few days. There are Orders given for building divers Ovens at *Boby* and *Demont*, places at the entrance into the Valley of *Barcelona*, which still confirms the design of passing the Mountains. The Count de *Breiner*, Commissary-General of the Imperial Forces, is gone to meet General *Caprara*, and to confer with him upon the Resolutions that have been taken by His Royal Highness and the General Officers of the Confederate Forces now in the Camp near *Pignerol*.

Turin, July 15. Our Army continues in the same Camp, only the Spaniards are advanced to *Riva*, something nearer to *Pignerol*, and have destroyed all the Corn and Forage to the very Walls of that place. Monsieur *Catinat*, who has lain some time at *Villars* in the *Pragelas*, has removed his Camp, and is now posted between the Abbey and *Pignerol*. Yesterday the Regiment commanded by the Marquis de *Mirimont* marched through this place: They came from *Vercelli*, where they had been in Garrison all Winter, and are making what haste they can to the Camp, whither the rest of the Troops in His Majesty's Pay here, will follow with all expedition. The *Vaudois* have put the Valley of *Kairas* under Contribution, and have already received it for one month. Count *Caprara* is not yet come, his Indisposition having retarded his Journey; however, he is expected in a day or two.

Milan, July 16. On the 12th instant arrived here the Velt-Marshal *Caprara*, being received by the Marquis de *Palavicino* in the Name of our Governor, the Marquis de *Legarez*, and conducted to the Palace; and on the 14th he proceeded on his Journey towards *Piedmont*, whither Count *Breiner*, the Imperial Commissary, who met him on the Confines of this State, returned three or four days before. Great quantities of Ammunition and Bombs are sent from hence to *Turin*.

Venice, July 18. The Pope's Gallies, with those of *Malta*, are gone from *Messina*, to joyne our Fleet in the *Levant*. The Magistrates of Health have opened again the free Commerce with *Naples*.

Vienna, July 21. We have Advice, That my Lord Ambassador *Harbud* arrived at *Esbeck* on the 11th instant; and that his Excellency intended on the 15th to set forward towards *Belgrade*. Prince *Lewis of Baden* will part from hence on Wednesday next, to command the Imperial Army; which is now encamped near *Esbeck*, consisting in 36000 Men, besides the Troops that are marching from *Upper Hungary*, and the *Radzians* and *Hungarians*, which latter make a Body of about 6000. General *Veterani*, being reinforced with four Regiments, lies encamped near *Temeswar*; but 'tis not known whether he intends to attack that Place, or only to oppose the Designs of *Teckley*, who has got together a Body of about 18000 Men. The Turks have quitted all the Country between the *Save* and the *Drave*; and the Imperialists have a Garrison at *Peter Waradin*, which is not above 20 English Miles from *Belgrade*. Our News from the Frontiers is, That things are in great Disorder in *Turky*; That the Janifaries refused to march; and that the new Visier was very sick, and his Recovery much doubted. Upon Advice that several Turkish armed Barks are entered into the River *Theyffe*, and gone towards *Sgedin*, the Emperor has given Orders to the Marquis de *Fleury* to pass forthwith with his Fleet down the *Danube*: The six Gallies that are fitting here, will be ready in five or six days. The Government of *Great Waradin* is given to General *Heister*; and at the same time the Emperor has made twelve new Lieutenant Velt-Marshal.

Heydelberg, July 26. The Confederate Forces under the Margrave of *Bareith* are still encamped near this place, where they were joyned yesterday by the Bavarian Regiment of *Schonvelt*. The Baron de *Soyer*, who was sent to the Landtgrave of *Hesse-Cassel*, returned to the Camp yesterday, from whence 3000 Horse were detached last night, and this morning the Margrave of *Bareith* went, with the other General Officers, to view the Ground about *Philippsburg*, in order to the marking out a Camp there, to which it's believed the Army will march to morrow, or the day following. In the mean time, Preparations are made for the laying a Bridge over the *Rhine*. Yesterday arriv'd from *Hailbron* several Pieces of great Cannon, for the Service of the Confederate Army. The Marschal de *Lorge* is encamped on the other side the *Rhine*, between *Worms* and *Gunthheim*.

Frankfort, July 27. The Landtgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* has his Quarters still at *Benheim* in the *Bergstrat*, where 'tis said he will continue, till the Bridges which are laying over the *Rhine* are finished. The Landtgrave, with the Baron de *Lippe*, General of his Forces, went on the 24th to *Mentz*, to confer with General *Thuingen*.

Cologne, July 29. The Letters from the *Upper Rhine* give an Account, That the Margrave of *Bareith* was decamped from *Hydelberg*, and marched higher up. The Landtgrave of *Hesse* lay at *Benheim*. 1800 Men of the Troops of *Wolfembuttel* had joyned the Confederate Army, and the Elector of *Saxony* sends to it 3000 Men, as his Quota, who we hear are come to *Hailbron*. The Forces of the Electors *Palatine* and *Cologne* are march'd from *Cornelis Munster* towards *Buschheid*.

Hamburg, July 29. They write from *Hannover*, That the Hunts-Master *Molcken*, who in *December* last was made a Prisoner by that Duke's Order, for having held Correspondencies tending to the Disturbance of his Government, &c. being brought to his Trial, had Sentence of Death passed upon him, and was accordingly beheaded on the 24th of this month. Lieutenant-Colonel *Molcken*, and the Secretary of *Wolfembuttel*, who were secured on the same Account, are both Banished out of his Highness's Dominions.

Paris, July 28. The great care that is taken by this Court to secure our Coasts, sufficiently shews the apprehensions and uneasiness they are under. The Duke de *Chaulnes*

Chaulnes is gone to *Brest*, to view the Fortifications of that place, and to give the necessary Orders for its Defence. The Marechal *d'Estree* has raised the *Arriurban* of *Poitou*; as is likewise done in other Maritime Provinces: and in all of them the Intendants are ordered very strictly to observe the New Converts. The *Sieur de Vaudricourt* arrived the 17th instant at *Brest*, with four Men of War from the *West-Indies*, whose Ships Companies are very much diminished by the Sickness that reign'd among them. They write from *Perpignan*, That the Duke of *Navailles* was encamped at *Morillas*; and that a Party of 150 of his Men had been set upon by the *Miquelets*, and most of them killed, and the rest taken Prisoners. The Letters from *Pignarol* of the 18th give an Account, That the Confederate Forces, which lay near that place, decamped on the 16th: the German and Spanish Forces, who had their Head-Quarters at *Motte* and *Marsaglia*, marching towards *Susa*, and the Duke of *Savoy's* Troops, who lay at *Buriasque*, taking their March towards *San Second*; and 'twas said that they would endeavour to enter into *France*.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Genap*, July 28. The Court-Martial is still sitting, upon the Trial of the Chevalier de *Granvalle*: On *Friday* and *Saturday* last his Examination was taken, and it remains now only that the Witnesses be confronted with him. Our Foragers going out yesterday, part of them happened to be near the French Troops commanded by the Marquis de *Boufflers*, who were marching towards *Namur*, which oblig'd them to return home without Foraging, and we lost some few Horses. The same day our Men surprized 50 of the Enemy, who had laid themselves in Ambush in a Wood, and took 40 of them Prisoners. The Prince de *Vaudemont* returned last night to the Camp, having found benefit by the Waters. The Duke of *Luxemburg* lies still at *Soignies*.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Eschenbeque*, July 31. We decamped this morning from *Genap*, and are now lying with our Left Wing to *Braine le Chateau*, and our Right opposite to *Halle*, about a League from that place. We shall march again to-morrow, to pass the River *Semois*, and to encamp at *Lambeque*: Our heavy Baggage is sent towards *Brussels*, and will re-join us in our next march. The Hancuer Troops encamp this night near *Bois Signior Isaac*. The Court-Martial has made an end of confronting the Witnesses with *Granvalle*, and now the Judge-Advocate is to make his demand, upon which they will proceed to Judgment. The French Army is still at *Soignies*. My Lord *Paget* left the Camp at *Genap*, in order to his return to *England*.

Hague, August 1: The States of *Holland* have this day adjourned themselves until the middle of *September*, unless something extraordinary shall occur to require their meeting sooner. The Letters from *Piedmont* advise, That the Duke of *Savoy* had divided his Army into three Bodies, and that they were marching with a resolution to force their way into *Dauphine*. They write from *Brussels* of the 30th past, That the Prince de *Barbancon*, late Governor of *Namur*, was under Confinement at *Louvain*; and that Informations were taking, in relation to his Conduct in the Defence of that Place. The Count de *Horne* lies with the Detachment under his Command about *Ghent*. The Elector of *Brandenburg* is with his Troops near *Leige*; and it's said that those of *Neuburg* and *Cologn* are to join him.

Kingsale, July 18. This evening is come in here the *Wild Prize*, Captain *Smith* Commander, who says, That last *Saturday* in the evening, being in company of the *Centurion* and the *Portsmouth*, they met a French Man of War of 50 Guns, with whom he left our two Frigats engag'd: The Privateer bore up to the *Wild Prize*, who was ordered into this Port, and Captain *Smith* fought him as long as he had any Ammunition.

Kingsweston, July 23. Just now sailed by a Vessel bound from *Cork* to *Bristol*, who reports, That on *Wednesday* last a French Man of War of 70 Guns was brought by some of our Frigats into *Kingsale*, being very much battered.

Falmouth, July 23. On *Thursday* last passed by this Harbor six Sail of great Ships, which, as we are informed by a Passenger put a-shoar near the *Lizard*, were bound home from the *Streights*; and that there came out with them from *Malaga* about 80 Sail more, who are gone North-about.

Plymouth, July 22. Yesterday Their Majesties Ship the *James Galley* brought into this Port a French Privateer of 18 Guns, 6 *Patereroes*, and 150 Men, which they took three-days before off of the *Lands-end*, after a Dispute of three hours; wherein 18 of the French were killed, and 9 or 10 wounded, and on our side four Men were killed, and the Captain and 11 wounded. Yesterday also the *Cluesley Galley* brought in a Ship of 90 Tuns, belonging to *Rotterdam*, and bound home from *Malaga*: She was taken by the French, and afterwards re-taken by the said Galley, who sailed from hence this day, with this and another Prize she brought in the last week. This day sailed hence several Tenders to the Fleet.

Hull, July 25. Yesterday arrived here seven Ships belonging to this place from *Rotterdam*, under Convey of two Dutch Men of War, who passed by with about 50 Sail, bound to *Stockton*, *Newcastle* and *Scotland*. In their passage, they gave Chace to a French Privateer; but it being calm Weather, they could not come up with him.

Deale, July 26. The 23d came into the *Down*: 4 Dutch Men of War, with several outward-bound Merchant-men: Two of the Men of War are going to the Fleet, and the other two are Convoys, who will sail this day.

Portsmouth, July 26. Their Majesties Forces designed for the present Expedition being all Shipp'd, the Duke of *Leinster*, who Commands them, went himself on Board the *Breda* yesterday in the evening; And His Grace, with all the Transport Ships, and the Squadron of Men of War appointed for their Convey, is now under Sail.
