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Rome, July 19.

THE Cardinal *de Fourbin* continues his Sollicitation in favour of the French Bishops, who assisted in the Assembly of 1682. and it's believed some Temperament will be at last found out to adjust this matter. The last week by Order of the Congregation of Health publick Notice was given here, That a free Commerce was restored with the Kingdom of *Naples*; and at the same time the Gates of this City that were shut up upon the breaking out of the Contagion in those Parts, were again opened, and the Guards withdrawn. The Bull for Suppression of the Nepotism has been made publick with the usual Formalities.

Genova, July 19. Three of this States Gallies are gone out to cruise against the Corsairs of *Barbary*; and 'tis reported that they have taken two of their Brigantines. From *Milan* we have Advice, That Orders were given for drawing together a Body of Men, who are to be posted about *Cazal*, to block up that Garison. By a small Vessel which came about eight days ago from *Marseilles*, we are informed, That the French Gallies were still in that Port; but the common Discourse was, That they were designed towards the Coast of *Catalonia*.

Venice, July 25. This week arrived here a Vessel from *Napoli di Romania*, who brings Advice, That the Convoys commanded by Signior *Priuli* and the Count *de Trautmansdorf* were daily expected to join the Fleet, which lay in that Port ready to sail. The Captain-General *Moenigo* stay'd only for these Supplies to open

the Campagne, where he is like to meet with no great Opposition from the Enemy, who have made little Preparation either by Sea or Land against this Republick, being wholly taken up with the care of carrying on the War in *Hungary*.

Warsaw, July 16. The last Letters from the Court of *Poland*, which still continues at *Jawarow*, say, That an Envoy was arrived there from the Cham of *Tartary*, to excuse the late Depredations that have been committed on the Frontiers of this Kingdom, as being done without his Order; and to offer his Mediation for the making a Peace between the Crown of *Poland* and the *Ottoman* Port: But this Errand being look'd upon only as a pretence to cover his Main Design of getting what Information he could of the present Posture of our Affairs, he was soon sent away again, with an Answer, That the King would not enter upon any such Negotiation, without the Concurrence of his Allies. Several Councils of War have been lately held at *Jawarow*, about the Affairs of the Campaign; and towards the end of this month the King will part from thence, to put himself at the Head of his Forces, which by that time will be all in a Body, together with those of *Lithuania*, near *Gliniam*, the place appointed for their general Rendezvous. The Crown-Generall is already gone to the Army, and Prince *James* makes Preparations to accompany the King into the Field. The Advices from *Walachia* tell us, That the Cham of *Tartary*, upon the repeated Orders he had received from the Port, had at last resolved to go with a Body of his Troops, and join the Turkish Army in *Hungary*; and some Letters say that he was already on his march.

Vienna, July 27. The General Officers that are still here, are now hastening away to the Army; and Prince *Louis* of *Baden* intends to go thither Post, and to set out in two or three days. In the mean time, Orders have been sent to General *Becke*, to send a strong Detachment from the Imperial Army near *Esseck*, to observe the Enemy, who, as we hear from the Frontiers, had passed the *Save* in several Bodies, and were forming a Camp near *Semlin*. The Regiments that are going from *Upper Hungary* to joyn the Imperial Army on the *Drave*, are already passed by *Buda*; and the Auxiliary Forces of *Munster* and *Lunenburgh* are likewise far advanced in their way thither. *Teckley* draws together some Troops near the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, and threatens to make an Invasion into that Principality, but without any great appearance of being able to effect it; General *Veterani* having posted himself so as that he may oppose any such Design and at the same time streighten the Garrison of *Temeswaer*.

Hamburg, August 1. They write from *Copenhagen* of the 29th past, That the King of *Denmark* intended to set out the 31st towards *Lalandt*; and after his return from thence, to take a Journey for a few days to *Holstein*. The Duke of *Zell* is gone to visit the Fortifications of *Ratsenburg* in the Country of *Saxe-Lawenburg*, on which several hundred Men are daily at work. The Duke of *Meclenburg* does fortifie *Butzow* and *Gustrow*, two small Places within that Principality. Lieutenant-Colonel *Molcke*, who is banished out of the Dominions of the Princes of *Lunenburgh*, came hither two days ago. We have Advice, That the Troops of *Munster* are on their march to joyn those of the Confederate Princes on the *Lower Rhine*.

Falmouth, August 1. We hear by a Vessel from *Scilly*, That the *Anne* of *London*, of about 280 Tuns, is put in there from *Maryland*, whence she came about six weeks ago.

Newcastle, August 2. On the 31st past failed out of our Harbor about 300 Laden Colliers, bound to the Southward, under the Convoy of two Men of War.

Portsmouth, August 4. Their Majesties Ships that are come in from Cruising on the Coast of *France*, have retaken several small English Ships that were taken lately in the Irish Seas by Privateers, having Commissions from the late King

James, one of which was found on board one of these Prizes, being dated the 22d of February last at *St. Germain*, and counter-signed *Melior*, by which *Patrick Lambert* is appointed Captain of the Frigate called the *Providance*, and empowered to enter into any Port or River of these Dominions, and either there, or at Sea, to take and apprehend, and in case of resistance to sink, fire, or otherwise destroy all Ships and Vessels, together with their Goods, Lading and Merchandizes, belonging to the Inhabitants of *England, Scotland, or Ireland*, or either of them, together with the Ships, Goods and Merchandizes of the States of the *United Provinces*, or their Subjects; and to bring or send up all such Ships and Goods as they shall take, into some Port of *France*, and to procure the same to be adjudged Lawful Prize in the next Court of Admiralty established by his dear Brother the Most Christian King. And the Tenth, and other Dues arising out of the said Prizes, are to be paid to *Thomas Stratford*, or in his absence to *Jean Nimport* of *Brest*, or to such other Persons as shall have Authority from the late King *James* to receive the same.
