

the middle of Headstone-lane for a distance of thirty-six chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the private roadway leading from Headstone Farm, and extending thence north-westward in precisely the same direction as the said private roadway, and in a straight line for a distance of forty-three chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the private roadway leading from Pinner Park Farm to Headstone-lane at a distance of twenty-four chains and a half or thereabouts measured in a direct line from the centre of the foot bridge situate near Hatch End Siding and leading across the main line of the London and North Western Railway, and extending thence north-westward and in a straight line for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the entrance gate of the house called Four Oaks in the middle of the new private road leading from that house into Uxbridge-road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said new private road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Uxbridge-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Uxbridge-road for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to the point where such road is joined by the footpath leading past the eastern side of the house called Wood Hall into Little Oxhey-lane, and extending thence first north-eastward and then northward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of seventy-seven chains and a half or thereabouts to a point distant five chains or thereabouts west of the middle of the main line of the London and North Western Railway upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Pinner from the said new parish of Saint Matthew, Oxhey."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fifth day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-

ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate at Landore, in the parish of Llangyfelach, in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Saint David's.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Landore as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Llangyfelach, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Landore as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Landore.'

"And with the like consent of the said John, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Paul, situate at Landore as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Landore, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Llangyfelach, in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Saint David's, which is bounded upon the south by the parish of Saint John juxta Swansea, upon the east by the parish of Llansamlet, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Llansamlet from the said parish of Llangyfelach at a point in the middle of the River Tawe, opposite to the eastern end of the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the premises of the Morrison Spelter Works, and extending thence north-westward to and along
