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Cadix, July 14.

THE Flota for *New-Spain* will depart in two days; and about the same time the Spanish Armada, Commanded by Don Pedro Corbute, will Sail up the *Streights*.

Turin, August 2. Yesterday arrived here a Courier from the Duke of *Savoy*, with Advice, That his Royal Highness had taken *Guitteftré*, in which was a Garison of about 500 French, and 200 Irish, who at first made some resistance, but seeing our Cannon ready to Fire upon them, yielded the 30th of the last Month at discretion, and were all made Prisoners of War. His Royal Highness attack'd afterwards a Bridge over the River *Durance*, where were posted 400 Men, but they made little opposition; and his Royal Highness having possessed himself of that Pass, sent a Detachment towards *Ambrun*, and followed himself with the rest of his Forces; who have burnt 8 or 10 Villages, and raised already large Contributions upon the Enemy. The Duke having taken with him 12 Pieces of Cannon from *Coni*, the like number has been sent thither from hence. Upon information that 1400 French were marching towards the Valley of *Aoste*, the Regiment of that name is sent to reinforce our Troops that were left there; and some Companies of this Regiment are to be put into the Fort of *Bard*, which Guards the Passage from the said Valley towards *Turée*.

Copenhagen, August 2. On the 10th of the last Month arrived here Mr. *John Butts*, Their Majesties Consul, who is since gone to his Residence at *Elsewore*. This morning the English Convoy Sailed out of the *Sound* with eight or Nine Merchant Ships, as also the Dutch Convoy with their Merchant-men.

Vienna, August 7. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, after having assisted at several Conferences of War which were held in the Emperors presence, parted from hence on the 5th instant for *Raab*, where he will make a short stay to take possession of that Government which the Emperor has lately given him, and then proceed with all the diligence possible on his journey towards *Peter Waradin*; The last Letters from thence inform us, That our Troops began to arrive in the Neighbourhood of that Place, and that upon their approach, the Turks who were come on this side the *Save* had repassed that River, and had broken down the Bridge they lately lay'd over it;

The Vessels that attended the Lord Ambassador *Harbord* to *Belgrade*, were returned to *Peter Waradin*, with an account that his Excellency was received by the Turks with great respect and kindness, being met and complimented by the chief Officers of the Garison, saluted with the Cannon, and welcomed by the people with acclamations of joy, on account of the Mediation he came to offer for the making a Peace, which is so earnestly desired by them. The Duke *de Crov* was Marching with 10000 Men to reinforce General *Veterani*, who it's believed has before this time besieged *Temeswarer*, with an Army of 25000 Men.

Hydelburg, August 12. The Confederate Army commanded by the Margrave of *Bavaria*, Marched yesterday from *Wieselock*, and designed to encamp this day near *Bruchsal*. The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassell* lies still at *Wernheym*; where three Squadrons and three Battalions of the Elector of *Saxony's* Troops, Commanded by the Count *de Promitz* joyn'd him yesterday. The Marechal *de Loge* is marched from *Ostlofen*, and lies now Encamped near *Wackenheym*; 'Tis reported, that he has sent a Detachment of 6000 Men towards *Flanders*.

Cologne, August 15. Four thousand Men of the Troops of *Munster* passed the River *Lippe* the 13th instant, and are to pass the *Rhine* at *Keyserwaert*, in order to their Conjunction with the Forces of *Nen-burg* and *Cologne*, which are at present Encamped at *Erpen* within three hours of *Aix la Chapelle*. The Advices from the *Upper Rhine* say, That the Confederate Forces commanded by the Margrave of *Bavaria* were Marched to *Bruchsal*; That 3000 Saxons had joyned the Troops of *Hesse* at *Veinheym*; and that the Marechal *de Loge* Marched the 8th from *Ostlofen*, and Encamped the 10th at *Wackenheym*, having sent a strong detachment towards the *Moselle*, and another towards *Savoy*. They write from *Francfort* of the 13th, That the Confederate Forces were going to repass the *Rhine*.

Hamburg, August 15. We hear from *Dresden* That the Elector of *Saxony* was very much indisposed, occasioned by a fall from his Horse, which sorely bruised him. The Velt Marechal *Schoning* is removed to *Stiria*; The Emperor has given leave that the Elector of *Saxony* may send some Commissioners to be present at his Examination and Tryal.

Paris, August, 15. The last Letters from *Grenoble* tell us, that the Duke of *Savoy* had sent a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons towards *Ambrun*, but that he

did not yet begin the Siege of that Place, saying for the rest of his Forces that were expected from Piedmont. The Duke of Savoy was marching towards the Castle of *Quira*, with a Design as was heard to make himself Master of it; upon which, the *Mar de Casar* had ordered 4 or 5000 Men to Succour the Place. They write from *Marsailles*, that they had disarmed 5 Gallies to put the Men on board the rest, and that the *Chamber de Noailles*, who Commands there, lay ready to sail, in order to observe the Spanish Fleet, who 'tis apprehended, designs to make some Attempts upon our Coasts in the *Mediterranean*.

Brussels, Aug 27. The Count *Borlaas de Tilly*, General of the Forces of *Leige*, passed through here this morning going towards His Majesty's Camp. The Escops of the Elector *Palatine* and *Cologne*, consisting of 3000 Men, are advanced within two Leagues of *Leige*, where the forces of *Brandenburg* were this morning on the eighth instant; but the Elector himself is returned to *Cloves*. The French Army decamped the 15th before break of day from *Guissengen*, and lies now between *Gammert* and *Lessines*; with their flight towards *Arch*.

From His Majesty's Camp at *La Visquee*, Aug 28. Several Regiments of English, Dutch, and Bani, which followed the march in the last Fight, have Orders to leave the Camp this Day, and to go into *Quaranters*; among which are the Battalion of *English Guards*, and the Regiments of the Prince of *Leffe* and Lord *Clats*, who are ordered to *Mahieu*. His Majesty has disposed of some of the vacant Regiments; The Lord *George Hamilton* is to have Sir *Robert Douglas's* Regiment; That of *Fuzeliers* is given to Colonel *Fitzpatrick*, and the Regiment he quits, to Lieutenant-Colonel *Collingwood*. Lieut. Coll. *Steady* of the *Guards* is to have *Hodges's* Regiment; and Lieut. Coll. *Mourne* of the *Royal Scotch Regiment* succeeds my Lord *Argus*. The Regiment of Horse lately Commanded by Sir *John Lamer*, with two Dutch Regiments of Horse, arrived two days ago at *Willemsstadt* from *England*, and have orders to join the Army. The French decamped last Friday from *Guissengen*, and marched nearer to *Lessines*. Orders are given for our marching to morrow towards *Ninove*.

Plymouth, August 11. Last night arrived here Their Majesties Ship the *Mary*, Captain *Butler* Commander, with several Merchant-men from the *Barbadoes*. They came from thence on the 14th of *June*, in company of the *Assistance*, and *Paul Fireship*, with a great Fleet of Merchant-men. The Fireship parted from them near the *Bermudas*, and came into this Port some days ago; and the *Assistance*, with most of the Merchant-men, were

separated from the rest in thick weather off of *Cape Clear*.

Portsmouth, August 13. Last Night happened a very violent Storm, accompanied with much Thunder and Lightning; but the Fleet, which now lies at *St. Helen*, has, God be thanked, received no damage, unless it be, that the *Adventure*, a Fourth Rate, had her Main-Mast and Topmast Splintered to pieces; and one or two other Ships have lost their Mizzen-Top-masts.

Whitehall, August 12. This day his Excellency the Lord Viscount *Sidney*, Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*, began his Journey thither, being accompanied out of Town, by many of the Nobility and other Persons of Quality.
