The Board of Trade have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of the following Notice, dated June 2, which appeared in the "Moniteur Belge," notifying the imposition of sanitary measures in Belgian ports on arrivals from Argentina:—

Peste en Argentine.

Le Ministre de l'Agriculture,
Vu l'arrêté royal du 5 avril 1897 relatif à la peste:

Vu l'existence de la peste en Argentine;
Considérant qu'il y a lieu dès lors de confirmer les mesures provisoires prises à l'égard des provenances de ce pays,

Arrête:

Art. 1er. Les dispositions qui font l'objet des articles 1er à 4 de l'arrêté royal du 5 avril 1897 susvisé, sont rendues applicables aux provenances de l'Argentine, contaminées par la peste bubonique.

Art. 2. Ces provenances, arrivant par mer, seront soumises à la station sanitaire de l'Escaut et dans les ports d'Ostende, Nieuport, Zeebrugge ainsi qu'à Selzaete, au régime stipulé par les chapitres II, III et IV du règlement sanitaire
