

King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter sixty; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Upper Edmonton, in the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Upper Edmonton, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John, situate at Upper Edmonton, as aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Upper Edmonton, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John, situate at Upper Edmonton as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint John, Upper Edmonton.’

“And with the like consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of the said diocese of London (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John, situate at Upper Edmonton, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

The District Chapelry of Saint John, Upper Edmonton, being:—

“All that part of the new parish (sometime

district chapelry) of Upper Edmonton, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is bounded upon the south by the new parish of Saint Paul, Tottenham, in the said county and diocese, upon the east partly by the new parish of Saint John, Walthamstow, and partly by the parish of Chingford, both in the county of Essex and in the diocese of Saint Albans, upon the north by the new parish of Saint Mary, Edmonton, in the said county of Middlesex, and in the said diocese of London, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary, Edmonton, from the said new parish of Upper Edmonton, at a point in the middle of Pymme’s Brook, opposite to the junction of Angel-road with Cross-street, and extending thence southward to the middle of Cross-street (thereby crossing Angel-road), and then along the middle of Cross-street for a distance of three chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Raynham-road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Raynham-road for a distance of a quarter of a chain or thereabouts to its junction with Wakefield-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of Wakefield-street for a distance of twelve chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Sandal-road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Sandal-road for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern end of the fence forming the western boundary of the house and premises known as number one, Sandal-road, and of the houses and premises on the western side of Raynham-avenue, and extending thence southward to and along the said boundary fence for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its southern end on the northern side of Claremont-street, and extending thence southward across Claremont-street for a distance of half a chain or thereabouts to the northern end of the wall forming the eastern boundary of the yard situate on the southern side of Claremont-street, and immediately opposite to the house known as number seventy-seven, Claremont-street, and extending thence southward along the last-mentioned boundary wall and along the fences in a line with that wall for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Upper Edmonton from the said new parish of Saint Paul, Tottenham.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.
