

is gone down the *Danube*, with the Fleet of Barks and Gallies under his Command, to attend the Motions of the Army. The truest Advices from *Sclavonia* say, That the Grand Visier arrived at *Belgrade* on the 2d instant, and that the whole Turkish Army lay encamped near that Place; That they were at work to finish their Bridges over the *Sava*, and that they designed to lay one over the *Danube* about three miles below *Belgrade*. They write from *Transylvania*, That 10000 Tartars were come into *Polackia*, in their march to join the Grand Visier. The Imperial Forces commanded by General *Veterani* are still posted on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*, their Head-Quarters being at a place called *St. George*.

Hydberg, August 19. The Confederate Army commanded by the Margrave of *Barcith* is marched from *Wisebeck* to *Obstadt*, where Count *Seym* joined them yesterday with seven Regiments. The Landgrave of *Hesse* continues encamped at *Veinheim*, on the other side of the *Neckar*. Orders are given to have all things in a readiness for the laying Bridges over the *Rhine*. The French Army lies about four miles from *Worms*.

Paris, August 22. On the 12th instant *Te Deum* was sung here for our late pretended Victory in *Flanders*, which those that are truly informed of that Action by Letters from their Friends in the Army, and know how little Honor as well as Advantage we gained by it, were much surpriz'd at; but this was thought necessary, it seems, to encourage the People, especially at this time, when such continual Alarms come from our Coasts concerning the motions of the Enemies Fleet, and from *Dauphiné* of the progress of the Duke of *Savoy*. Frequent Considerance here from those Parts, the last came here yesterday in the evening, and went on directly to *Paris*; but we do not yet hear what News he brings. The Letters from *Dauphiné* of the 12th and 15th give an Account, That the Duke of *Savoy* has formally besieged *Ambrun*, the Frenches being opened on the 6th instant; and that 'tis given out that the Garrison has made several vigorous Sailes, and killed divers of the Enemy, and that Monsieur *Catinat*, who was encamped with 26 Battalions at *Prele*, about two Leagues from *Briancon*, and five from *Ambrun*, was drawing all the Force he could together to succor the place, yet they cannot conceal their apprehensions that it is taken. From *Rochele* they write of the 12th, That the *Marschal d'Arde* had put 800 Men more into that Town, as well to reinforce the Garrison, as to observe the Inhabitants upon whom they are quartered. Monsieur *de Bachevillers* is posted with some Troops to cover *Genoble*, where the consternation is great: They work very hard there to repair the Ditches and Walls of the Town, and have demolished the Suburbs, and cut down all the Fruit Trees as well as others round the place, which has ruined a great many poor People, and inconvenient many others. Two Regiments of Dragoons, one of *Bretany* and the other of *Hou*, had pass'd by that City in their march towards *Prinimat*, which are likewise sent eight Battalions of Foot, with several Detachments from *Flamers* and *Germany*. From *Auvergne* we have an Account, That within these three or four months many poor People have died in that Country of a Dilemper occasioned by their ill Nourishment, which carry with them an Infection, and are now got among the rest of better Quality. Several Towns are already abandoned, and *Thiers* among others; and some persons who were the last Season at the Waters of *Vichy*, say, The place is filled with poor Families, who have not wherewithal to subsist: but, notwithstanding the great Necessities they are under, 'tis observed that the Peasants refuse to receive the Corn which the King had sent to be distributed among them, for fear of being thereby engaged and list'd in the Service of his Armies. Here are Letters from *Turky*, which say, That the Grand Signior is deposed, and the Son of *Miskomet IV.* placed upon the Throne, who is very much inclined to a Peace; And that *Teckley* had sent his Secretary privately to General *Veterani*, to treat with him as well about his own Accommodation, as a Peace with the *Turks*: which, though it comes from hands that have in other occasions given very quick and early Advices, we must expect a Confirmation of by our next Letters from those parts. The Pope's Nuncio had on *Friday* last a private Audience of the French King; and the day before Count *Ballati*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of *Hanover*, took his leave, in order to his return home.

From His Majesty's Camp at Sr. Lievens Hautem, Aug. 22. We decamped this Morning from *Ninow*, and march'd 3 Leagues to this place, being about the like distance from *Ghent*; Our heavy Baggage was sent away yesterday in the Afternoon by the way of *Alost*; and will not join us again these 3 or 4 days. In our march the Spanish Cross which were in the Van of the Army, having notice that a Party of French Grenadiers lay in a Wood near the place where our Grand Guard is now, they surpris'd them, killed 5, and took 105 Prisoners, among whom were two Captains, and two Lieutenants. We shall march again tomorrow to *Gawre* to pass the *Schelde* there; and if that we shall continue our march the day after. The Marquis *de Boufflers* is, we hear, removed from *Claire* towards *Audenarde*. The Duke of *Luxemburg* lay this Morning still encamped at *Lignes*; He has sent a strong Detachment towards *Savoy*.

Hague, August 26. The Letters from *Piedmont* give an Account, That the Duke of *Savoy* invited *Ambrun* the 3d instant, but the Frenches were posted on the 5th; and that the Army of *France* arriv'd there from *Comen* on the 8th: And by the way of *Paris* we hear, That the Town is taken of me by Assault, or by Capitulation; 'Tis added, That his Royal Highness took afterwards the Castle of *Quevas*; and that Monsieur *Catinat* advanced by *Mont Genevre* with 6000 Men; but that he was not in a Condition to make head against our Army, which consisted of 20000 Men. The Forces of *Brandenburg* continue about *Leige*, where, 'tis said, they are to be joyn'd by those of *Cologne*, *Newburg* and *Munster*.

Plimsouth, August 16. The last week arriv'd here several French Privateers, who made their escape from *France* in an open Boat. The *Oxford* is come in from Cruising, and the *Andie* from *Spithead*. This day they have been at work on the *Harrietta*, which was sunk here some time ago, and have weigh'd her so far, that 'tis not doubted but if the Weather continues fair, she will be got to the Shore by the end of this week.

Hull, August 17. Yesterday arriv'd here two Vessels from the *South*, from whence they came in Company of about 20 Sail, under the Convoy of Their Majesty's Ships the *Princess Anne* and the *Virgins Prize*, who are gone for *London* and other Ports.

Dunk, Aug. 19. The Duke of *Leinster* has received Orders to Sail with Their Majesty's Forces under his Command; and the Ships are now Unmooring in order to their Sailing this Afternoon.
