NORTHAMPTONSHIRE (SWINE-FEVER)
ORDER OF 1906 (No. 3).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Part II. (*Restriction on movement of Swine within certain Area*) of the Northamptonshire (Swine-Fever) Order of 1905 and the several Orders amending that provision are hereby revoked from and after the ninth day of November, nineteen hundred and six.

NOTICES TO MARINERS.

(Nos. 1245 to 1260 of the year 1906.)

[The bearings are magnetic, and those concerning the visibility of lights are given from seaward.]

No. 1245.—INDIA, WEST COAST.

Port of Bombay—Mine Practice Field.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 49 of 1906:—

The Government of India has given notice, dated 19th September, 1906, that between 15th October, 1906, and 31st March, 1907, the under-mentioned area to the westward of Karanja Beacon, Port of Bombay, would be reserved for use as a mine practice field.

The area would be 1,360 yards long by 470 yards wide; the western limit being marked by three buoys, and the eastern limit by two buoys, as follows:—

Western limit.—The north-west corner buoy would be red, and placed in a position $6\frac{4}{10}$ cables N. 68° W. from Karanja Beacon. The south-west corner buoy would be red, and placed in a position $6\frac{2}{10}$ cables N. 88° W. from Karanja Beacon. Midway between these two buoys, a buoy chequered red and white surmounted by a metal flag similarly coloured would be placed.

Eastern limit.—The north-east corner buoy would be black and placed in a position about 40 yards N. 77° E. from Karanja Beacon. The south-east corner buoy would be black and placed at a distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ cables S. 13° W. from Karanja Beacon.

Vessels must neither pass through nor anchor within this area.

NOTE.—The limits of the mine fields given in Notice No. 49 of this year have been erased from the chart.

Approximate position, Karanja Beacon, lat. $18^{\circ} 54\frac{3}{4}'$ N., long. $72^{\circ} 53'$ E.

Sabine Bank—Fog-Signal Established.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 259 of 1906:—

The United States Government has given further notice that, on 16th September, 1906, a fog-trumpet, giving one blast every thirty seconds, thus:—blast, five seconds; silent interval, twenty-five seconds, was established at Sabine Bank Lighthouse.

Approximate position, lat. $29^{\circ} 28\frac{1}{2}'$ N., long. $93^{\circ} 43\frac{1}{4}'$ W.
