The Board of Trade have received a copy of a Quarantine Notice, dated December 10th, issued by the Governor of Malta, stating that in addition to the articles mentioned in Notice No. 134 of the 21st July last, the importation of cotton seed is prohibited unless accompanied by a certificate from the British Consular Authority, or, where there is no such authority, from the local Government Authority, to the effect that anthrax is not prevalent in the district in which such cotton seed was grown.
