

as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

And whereas the County Council of West Suffolk having made application to Us to make a Regulation in pursuance of the above-mentioned Sub-section putting the provisions of that Sub-section in force within the limits comprising parts of certain roads situate within the Urban District of Newmarket, in the county of West Suffolk, We directed a Local Inquiry to be held into the matter by one of Our Inspectors, and the Inquiry was held accordingly, and Report has been made to Us thereon:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us in that behalf, We do, by this Our Order, make the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—The provisions of Sub-section (1) of Section 9 of the Act with respect to the driving of a motor car at a speed not exceeding ten miles per hour shall apply and have effect within the limits comprising the parts of roads within the Urban District of Newmarket which are specified in the Schedule hereto.

ARTICLE II.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the first day of February, one thousand nine hundred and seven.

SCHEDULE.

Bury-road, from the Toll Gate to its junction with High-street; High-street, from its junction with Bury-road to the Cemetery on the Cambridge-road.

ORDER of the Local Government Board: Out-door Labour Test: altering Consolidated Order:—

KNARESBOROUGH UNION.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Knareborough Union;—

To the Overseers of the Poor of the several Parishes comprised in the said Union;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

Whereas by an Order made by the Poor Law Board on the 28th day of June, 1854, relating to the Knareborough Union, the Guardians of the Poor of that Union were required to appoint a Superintendent of Out-door Labour;

And whereas by an Order dated the 7th day of May, 1858, the Poor Law Board prescribed Regulations with respect to the administration of the relief of poor persons in the said Union;

And whereas it is expedient that further provision should be made with regard to the relief of the Poor and with regard to the services of a Superintendent of Out-door Labour in the said Union:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, We, the Local Government Board, hereby Order as follows; that is to say:—

ARTICLE 1. Subject to the provisions of the said Order dated the seventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, every able-bodied male pauper who receives out-door relief within the said Union shall be relieved in the following manner; that is to say,—

Half at least of the relief given to the pauper shall be given in food, clothing, and other articles of necessity.

No such pauper shall receive relief from the Guardians, or any of their officers, or any Overseer of any Parish in the Union, while he is employed for wages or other hire or remuneration by any person; but every such pauper so relieved shall be set to work by the Guardians.

ARTICLE 2. The Guardians shall, within fourteen days after the date of this Order, and from time to time afterwards as the Local Government Board require, report to the Local Government Board the place or places at which able-bodied male paupers are so set to work in the Union, the sort or sorts of work in which they or any of them are employed, the times and mode of work, and all such other matters relating to the employment of the said able-bodied paupers as the Guardians deem material to be communicated to the Local Government Board, or as the Local Government Board require.

ARTICLE 3. If the Guardians depart, in any particular instance, from any of the regulations hereinbefore contained, and within fifteen days after the said departure report the same and the grounds thereof to the Local Government Board, and if the Local Government Board approve of that departure, then the relief granted in the particular instance shall, if otherwise lawful, not be deemed to be unlawful, or be subject to be disallowed.

ARTICLE 4. If at any time the number of able-bodied male paupers requiring relief is so small as to render the services of a Superintendent of Out-door Labour unnecessary, the Guardians, notwithstanding anything in the said Order dated the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, may dispense with the services of that officer.
