Algiers, July 15.

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HE Dey has been very successful in his Expedition against Muley Ismael, having entred into his Dominions, where he defeated two numerous Armies, and killed above 26000 Men; and advancing afterwards with his Forces before Mackeneffe with intention to attack that place, the Cherif came out, and lighting from his Horse at some di-flunce from the Dey's Tent, went to him on soor, and with the humblest gestures of Submittion begg'd his Mercy; whereupon, by the interpolition of the Maribots, a Peace was concluded, of which the Conditions are thus far known: That he presented the Dey with a Horse and Furniture which cost 200000 Crowns, and 48 Mules laden with Gold, and Muley Zeidan, his elder Son, accompanies the Dey as an Hostage for performance of the rest. Here has been kept a Festival of 7

days for this great Success.

Terin, August 26. The Duke of Savey lay still encamped on the 24th instant about Ambrun, but was preparing for a farther Progress into Dauphiné. The Forcescemmanded by Count Palfi continue in the Valley of Susa; and Don Gioseppe d'Azza is possed with 1500 Horse about Pignerol, to observe that Garison.

Genoa, August 23. On Monday last arrived here a Felacca in five days from Gatalonia, who brought Advice, That the Spanish Armada, under the Command of Don Pedro de Corbette, was arrived on that Coast. The French Galkys are still at Toulon.

Venice, August 29. We have had no Letters from our Army since those of the 20th past: but by the way of Zant we hear, That our Troops have taken the Castle of Cristat near Canea. On the 22d instant parted from hence a great Convov for the Levant. great Convoy for the Levant.

Lemberg in Poland, August 27. The Forces of this Crown lie still encamped near Convick, where they expect in few days to be joyn'd by the Troops of Lithumia: The Court in the mean time continues at Jamarow. From the Frontiers of Moldavia we hear, That the Tartar Han is marched with 15000 Men to joyn the Ottoman Army in Hungary, having left some Troops about Budziack, who are to be joyned by a Body of Turks, in order, as it's believed, to attack Sorock; whereupon the Castelan Chelmich; is helbard and the Dorock to Dorock Chelmski is hastened away with a Detachment, to reinforce that Garison; and at the same time a Sum of Money has been sent to be distributed among the Cossacks, for the encouraging them to contribute what depends on them for the Preser-

vation of that Place.

Vienna, August 31. The Letters from Esseck of the 24th instant inform us, That Prince Lewis of Baden arrived the 22d in the Imperial Camp near Valkovar; That he had and the Imperial Camp near Valkovar; That he had taken a Review of the Troops, which lay encamped in two Lines; and that the whole Army would much towards Peter Waradin, to foon as the Auxiliary Forces of Hanguer had joyned it; That Prince Lewis had ordered 12 great Burques to be fitted, which were to carry each 8 Pieces of Cannon and 40 Musquereers, besides Rowers, and had sent some Troops to reintorce the Garison of Peter Waradin. The Advices from the Frontiers say. That the Turks had not yet sings their Bridges over the Save and the Danube; and that their Army was still encamped on the other side of that River about Belgrade. Tis consimmed by the last Letters from General Veterani, who commands the Imperial Forces on the Frontiers of Transitivania, That the 10000 Tartars, who were coming to joyn the Octomin Army in Hungary, had mutiny'd a gainst the Cham, and were retired in great discontent towards Budziak.

Heydelberg, September 6. The Confederate Army, commanded by the Landgrave of Heff: and the Margrave of Bareith, passed the Rhine the tit and 2d instant near Manheim; On the 3d they divided their Treops into two Bodies; the Margrave taking his march towards Sieverstade and Dudenhoven, and the Landtgrave towards Spiers: But the Enemy had possessed themselves of the Passes on the Spierback (a small River that passes through Neuslads, and falls into the Rhine near Spires) which occasioned a Skirmssh between them and some of our Troops that had the Vanguard, in which we lost a Lieutenant-Colonel, a Major, and some private Soldiers: The French had likewise divers killed and wounded in this occasion. det in this occasion. On the 4th the Consederate Army was encamped within half a League of Spire, and a Council of War was held among the General Officers, but we do nor yet hear what Resolution they have taken.

Cologne, Sept. 9. The Letters from the Upper Rhine tell us, That the Landtgrave of H see and the Margrave of Bareith, having with the Consederate Forces under their Command passed the Rhine at Mauheim, they continued their march towards Spire, where the Enemy had intrenched themselves along the little River Spireback: There happened several Skirmishes between the Vanguards of the two Armies, and a detachment of the Consederates attempted a Pass that was guarded by the French; but not being able to force it, they retired, having lost about also Men, among whom was Lieutenant Colonel Schmit, Major Sadler, and two Captains. A Party of Hussias has made an Excursion as far as Keyserlantern, and brought back a great number of Prisoners and Horses. The Bridge of Boats is removed from Wormes to Spire, and the two Regiments of Hussias, who had layn several days about Menta, are marched to joyn the Consederate Army.

Paris, September 8. The last Letters from Dauphine give an Account, That the Duke of Savoy having lett three Regiments in Garison at Ambrun, marched on to Gap, into which place he entred on the 29th pass, without any opposition; Monsiers de Bachevilliers, who was posted with a Body of Horse near that place, retiring upon his approach. The fear and consternation is very great in all that Province: At Grenoble they continue with an extraordinary diligence to fortific the Town; on the 30th of the last month they pulled down the New Parish, and

and the Great Recollects; and 'tis under confideration to pull down likewise the Carmelites. All the Women of Quality are retired from thence to Lyons. Monsteur de Grancey, Brigadier, has put himself into the place, to command there: but the Garison consists only of the five Battalions, and 150 Dragoons, who were at Andrun: They are indeed obliged by the Capitulation not to serve any m.re against the Duke of Savoy during this Compagn; but this Court can dispinse, when 'its for their conveniency, with such formals ies. All the Boats on the River Iser from Montruelian as far as Valence, are chain'd up, that the People may not make use of them; every one packing up his Goods, in order to retire to places of greater Security. Monsteur de Vauhan, the French King's chief Engineer, has let Flanders, and we are assued that he is gone, without coming to Paris, towards Dauphiné, to give the necessary Orders for the Security of the places on that side. Monsteur de Carinat was come with fix Battalions to the Bourg of Orsan, and intended to post himself in the Pass of la Haute Croix, to hinder the Enemy from marching that way, which is the easiest to pass, though tarther about. The Enemy give out, That a Reinforcement of 6000 Germans is coming to hem, and that they will take their Winter-Quarrers in Dauphins'; though some think they will rather move towards Susteron, in order to pass into Provence, or by the way of Dye into the Valentinois. 'Tis ad that Count Pass has with the Forces under his Command invested Susa. All these Advices do greatly disquier this Court. The Marquis d'Escots, Colonel of the Regiment of Actois, and the King's Lieurenant in the Province of Brie, who was lately taken Prif. ner, together with the Prince d'Emichemoniand divers other Officers of Note, by a Party of the Troops of Leige near Namur, is since dead of his Wounds at Huy: The Government of Peronne, vacant by the Death of the Marquis de Hocquincourt, who was killed in the Sumestaut. of the Marquis de Hocquincourt, who was killed in the fame Action, is given to his Brother the Abbot de Hocquincourt, who has pur himself in o the Company of Musquereers. The Seur de Forant, Commander of a Squincourt, and the oldest Officer in the French Fleet, dyed at Brist the 29th past, aced 80 years.

From His Majesty's Camp at Grammen, Sept. 11.
The Duke of Leinster was encamped on Tuesday last, with the Forces under his Command, at Oust Dunkirk, about a League from Furnes, from whence he was to march to Dunkirk, and it's believed he is now before that place. The E. of Portland and Monfieur d'Auverquerque went to that Army last Tuesday, and yesterday morning another Detachment was fent thither of four Regiments of Horse. On Monday in the evening about 60 dismounted French Troopers came within a mile of our Camp, thinking to take some of our Horses that were at Grafs, but being difcovered, 20 of them were killed, and 25 taken Prisoners. Yesterday a small Party of ours advancing within less than a League of the Enemies Camp, they met with some of their Foragers, of whom they killed 30, and took 12 Prisoners, and brought away besides about 40 Horses and three Mules. The Duke of Luxemburg's Army is still about Courtray, and the Marquis de Boufflers was last Friday at Brinch beyond Mons.

Hague, September 12. The Elector of Brandenburg has been incognite at Amflerdam, from whence he returned on The stay last towards Cleves. The Cannon, Mortars, Bombs, Carcasses, &c. that were lately brought from Maissircht, are arrived in Flanders; and yesterday some Boats of a new Invention sailed out of the Maese towards that Coass. The Letters from Damphins tell us, That the Progresses of the Duke of Savoy do put all that Country into a mighty Consternation; That his Royal Highness was come to Gap, and had sent a Detachment towards Grewble, from whence most of the principal Inhabitants were fird with their families to Lyons and other places.
