

and the Great Recollects; and 'tis under consideration to pull down likewise the Carmelites. All the Women of Quality are retired from thence to Lyons. Monsieur de Grancey, Brigadier, has put himself into the place, to command there: but the Garrison consists only of the five Battalions, and 150 Dragoons, who were at Anbrun: They are indeed obliged by the Capitulation not to serve any more against the Duke of Savoy during this Campaign; but this Court can dispense, when 'tis for their convenience, with such formalities. All the Boats on the River Isere, from Montmelian as far as Valence, are chain'd up, that the People may not make use of them; every one packing up his Goods, in order to retire to places of greater Security. Monsieur de Vaudan, the French King's chief Engineer, has left Flanders, and we are allud that he is gone, without coming to Paris, towards Dauphiné, to give the necessary Orders for the Security of the places on that side. Monsieur de Carinat was come with six Battalions to the Bourg of Orsan, and intended to put himself in the Pass of la Haute Croix, to hinder the Enemy from marching that way, which is the easiest to pass, though farther about. The Enemy give out, That a Reinforcement of 6000 Germans is coming to them, and that they will take their Winter-Quarters in Dauphiné; though some think they will rather move towards Sisteron, in order to pass into Provence, or by the way of Dye into the Valentinois. 'Tis said that Count Pajsi has with the Forces under his Command invetted Sisa. All these Advices do greatly disquiet this Court. The Marquis d'Escois, Colonel of the Regiment of Aetois, and the King's Lieutenant in the Province of Brice, who was lately taken Prisoner, together with the Prince d'Emichenont and divers other Officers of Note, by a Party of the Troops of Leige near Namur, is since dead of his Wounds at Huy: The Government of Peronne, vacant by the Death of the Marquis de Hocquincourt, who was killed in the same Action, is given to his Brother the Abbot de Hocquincourt, who has put himself into the Company of Musqueteers. The Seur de Forant, Commander of a Squadron, and the oldest Officer in the French Fleet, dyed at Brst the 29th inst, aged 80 years.

From His Majesty's Camp at Grammen, Sept. 11. The Duke of Leinster was encamped on Tuesday last, with the Forces under his Command, at Oost Dunkirk, about a League from Furnes, from whence he was to march to Dunkirk, and it's believed he is now before that place. The E. of Portland and Monsieur d'Auverquerque went to that Army last Tuesday, and yesterday morning another Detachment was sent thither of four Regiments of Horse. On Monday in the evening about 60 dismounted French Troopers came within a mile of our Camp, thinking to take some of our Horses that were at Grass, but being discovered, 20 of them were killed, and 25 taken Prisoners. Yesterday a small Party of ours advancing within less than a League of the Enemies Camp, they met with some of their Foragers, of whom they killed 30, and took 12 Prisoners, and brought away besides about 40 Horses and three Mules. The Duke of Luxemburg's Army is still about Courtray, and the Marquis de Boufflers was last Friday at Brinch beyond Mons.

Hague, September 12. The Elestor of Brandenburg has been incognito at Amsterdam, from whence he returned on Tuesday last towards Cleves. The Cannon, Mortars, Bombs, Carcasses, &c. that were lately brought from Mastricht, are arrived in Flanders; and yesterday some Boats of a new Invention sailed out of the Maese towards that Coast. The Letters from Dauphiné tell us, That the Progresses of the Duke of Savoy do put all that Country into a mighty Consternation; That his Royal Highness was come to Gap, and had sent a Detachment towards Grenoble, from whence most of the principal Inhabitants were fled with their Families to Lyons and other places. The States of Holland are again assembled.

Dublin, August 31. We are now preparing for the Parliament, which is to meet here on the 5th of October next: The Writs are given out,

which were sealed the 26th instant. On the 28th the Lord Archbishop of Dublin, at the Head of his Clergy, waited upon my Lord Lieutenant, to compliment his Excellency upon his entering on this Government; and soon after the Bishop of Meath, Chancellor of this Univerfity, came with all his Society to make his Excellency the like Compliment.

Plimouth, Sept. 4. On Wednesday last arrived here 12 English Merchant-men from Virginia: the rest of the Fleet, to the number of about 60 Sail, passing the same day by this Port to the Eastward. On Thursday came in three Dutch Men of War, to convey their homeward-bound St. Tubes Fleet. On Friday sailed hence the Mary and Assistance, with the homeward bound Barbadoes Ships; and this day came in here the Frigate in six weeks from Boston in New-England.

Deal, September 6. Yesterday came into the Downs 20 Sail of Merchant Ships, under the Convoy of Their Majesties Ships the Mary and Assistance from the West Indies.
