A PROCLAMATION.

Isle of Man to Wit.

WHEREAS the infectious disease, known as Swine Fever, at present exists in the United Kingdom:

And whereas, in order to prevent the introduction of the disease into this island, it is deemed advisable to make orders for regulating the importation of swine:

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two Members of the Council, under the powers conferred by The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, do hereby order as follows:—

1. Any person desiring to import swine into this island from the United Kingdom shall make an application to the Chief Constable of this island at least seven days before the date on which it is intended to import such swine, for permission to do so.

2. Such application shall contain a statement of the ages, colour, sex, appearance, and condition of the swine which it is so intended to import.

3. Such application shall be accompanied with an affidavit, duly sworn before a Justice of the Peace, from the person or persons whose property the swine have been during the three months immediately preceding, that they have not been in contact with any swine affected with Swine Fever during the six months immediately preceding the date of such affidavit.

4. On receipt of these particulars, it shall be lawful for the Chief Constable to sanction the

importation of such swine or any of them. But no swine shall be imported unless such permission has been given by the Chief Constable in writing.

5. The person importing such swine shall give at least twenty-four hours' notice, in writing, to the Collector of Customs and the Chief Constable, of the port at which he proposes to land such swine, and of the boat by which he proposes to import them.

6. No swine shall be permitted to be so landed which do not appear to be included among those for whose landing the Chief Constable's permission has been obtained.

The Order in Council of the 16th day of April, 1896, is hereby repealed.

A PROCLAMATION.

Isle of Man to Wit.

WHEREAS the infectious disease, known as Scab, at present exists amongst sheep in the United Kingdom:

And whereas, in order to prevent the introduction of the said disease into this island, it is deemed advisable to make orders for regulating the importation of sheep therein:

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two Members of the Council, under the powers conferred by The Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, do hereby order as follows:—

1. Any person desiring to import sheep into this island from the United Kingdom, shall make an application to John Q. Cannell, C.P., of Ballacarnae, Michael, Isle of Man, the duly appointed Inspector of Scab, at least seven days before the date on which it is intended to import such sheep, for permission to do so.

2. Such application shall be accompanied with an affidavit, duly sworn before a Justice of the Peace, from the person desiring to import the sheep, that they are free from Scab.

3. On receipt of such affidavit, it shall be lawful for the Inspector to sanction the importation of such sheep, and no sheep shall be imported unless such permission has been given by the Inspector in writing.

4. The person importing such sheep shall give at least twenty-four hours' notice, in writing, to the Chief Constable of this isle, and to the Inspector, of the port at which he proposes to land such sheep, and of the boat by which he proposes to import them.

5. No sheep shall be permitted to be so landed which do not appear to be those for whose landing the Inspector's permission has been obtained.
