Chedúba Strait, Northern Approach—Particulars of Volcanic Island.

The Government of India has given notice, dated 15th January, 1907, that the result of a recent survey shows that the volcanic island, which has appeared in the northern approach to Chedúba Strait, is 19 feet above high water, and is 307 yards long in a north-north-westerly and south-south-easterly direction, and 217 yards broad. There appears to be no change in the soundings as shown on the chart around it. A pole, to which a flag was attached, has been erected on the summit in approximately lat. 19° 0′ 5″ N., long. 93° 24′ 20″ E.

Borkum Light-Vessel—Submarine Fog-Bell.

Walfisch Bay-Beacons Erected.

Information, dated 18th January, 1907, has been received from the Commander-in-Chief at the Cape of Good Hope that the undermentioned beacons have been erected for special purposes, unconnected with navigation, on the Walfisch

Peninsula, Walfisch Bay, in the following positions:—

- (1) A beacon, surmounted by a small diamond shape with a signal yard under it, in a position $9\frac{8}{10}$ cables N. 5° E. from the observation spot.
- (2) A beacon, surmounted by a small disc, with horizontal bar, in a position $3\frac{2}{10}$ cables N. 58° W. from beacon No. 1.
- (3) A beacon, surmounted by a small St. Andrew's Cross, in a position $3\frac{3}{10}$ cables N. 39° W. from the observation spot.
- (4) A beacon, surmounted by a St. Andrew's Cross, in a position 3 10 cables S. 67° W. from No. 3 beacon.
- (5) A beacon, surmounted by a small diamond shape, in a position 14 cables S 35° W. from the observation spot.
- (6) A beacon, surmounted by a small disc, in a position $4\frac{2}{10}$ cables N. 58° W. from No. 5 beacon.

Also that Pelican Point is gradually extending further northward; caution is therefore necessary in rounding this point at night.

Approximate position, observation spot, lat. 22° $55\frac{1}{2}$ S., long. 14° 26' E.

La Paz Harbour—Light Altered.

Information, dated 24th January, 1907, has been received through His Britannic Majesty's Consul in Mexico, that the white group occulting light, formerly shown from the tubular iron column, painted red, erected on the beach at a distance of 70 yards N. 85° W. from the Custom House at La Paz, has been replaced by a red fixed light, elevated 29 feet above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 6 miles, and exhibited from the same structure, the light power being 80 candles.

From the Mexican Light List of 1905, it appears that no light is exhibited from the pier head at La Paz as shown on the charts.
