Genova, Aug. 30.

**B**y a Felucca which arrived here this Week in 7 days from *Marseilles*, we have advice, That the French have disarmed there 5 of their Gallies, as also several of those that are at present at *Thoulon*, and sent the Soldiers who serv'd on them towards *Dauphine*. Two days ago came hither 1500 Soldiers from *Corsica*, where they have been lately raised for the Service of this Republick; and some Companies of them have been since sent to *Gaul*. A Felucca belonging to *Naples* has brought to *Oneglia* a French Bark laden with Salt and Fish. This Week was remitted from hence 70000 pieces of Eight to *Turin*.

*Turin*, Sept. 2. The Letters from our Army give an account, That after the taking of *Ambrun*, several Conferences of War were held there, and in pursuance of the Resolutions taken in them, the Marquis de *Leganez*, Governor of *Milan*, marched back to *Guillestre* with part of the Spanish Forces, and a Detachment of 3000 Men out of the other Troops; to maintain a Communication between those two places, and to observe Monsieur *Catinat* who was posted near *Briancon*; and on the 27th of the last Month his Royal Highness decamped with the rest of the Army from *Ambrun*, and marched to *Savines*, where the Enemy had lodged some of their Troops to guard the Bridge over the *Durance*, at the end of which they had likewise cast up a Redoubt, the better to secure it; but upon the approach of our Forces they abandoned that Post, and our Men possessed themselves of it. Here his Royal Highness found himself indisposed; however, on the 29th he continued his march to *Gap*, into which place he entered the same day without any opposition, most of the Inhabitants being fled to *Grenoble*; but his Illness encreasing, and turning to the Small-Pox, he was brought back to *Ambrun*, which has very much troubled the Court here. General *Valsi* continues his Preparations (as it's believed) for the attacking of *Susa*; and 10 pieces of Cannon for Battery, with 6 Mortars, will be sent him from hence. We hear that the Governor of *Milan* is marched again towards *Ambrun* and *Gap*, having left only a Detachment of 4500 Men to guard the Passes at *Guillestre* and *St. Clements*.

*Milan*, Septemb. 3. We are told that Directions are come from the Emperor and the King of *Spain*, not to permit the usual Commerce of Corn and

Salt with the *Suiffers*, and to forbear paying them their yearly Penfions till farther Order, which is occasioned by their having broken their Capitulation with the House of *Austria*, whereby they are obliged not to suffer their Troops to serve the French King in the Field, as they have of late done in several Occasions in *Flanders*, but only in his old Garisons. *Cazall* is closely blockt up, and the Garison, which consists of 1500 French and 1500 Italians, begins to be in great want of Wood for Fuel.

*Venice*, Sept. 5. We have had no News this Week from our Army before *Canea*. The *Tripolis* have lately taken several small Vessels on the Coast of *Candia*, as also a Genouefs Ship bound home from this place. The Count de *Rabenac*, the French Envoy, does very earnestly sollicite the Princes of *Paly*, to whom he is employed to enter into a League for securing their Territories from Winter-Quarters, but hitherto he has had but little success in this Negotiation.

*Viena*, Sept. 7. The Letters of the 2d instant from the Imperial Army, which was then encamped 2 Leagues beyond *Valkovar*, confirm the News of the *Radzians* having taken the Treasure of the Turks, designed for the Service of this Campaign, which they have brought into our Camp; The Turkish Horse that was sent in pursuit of them retiring in great hast and disorder upon the advice they received that a Body of Germans was advancing towards them; The Money now taken by the *Radzians* is all in Ducats, and amounts to a Million and half. Our Army was to decamp on the third, and to continue their march towards the *Sava*. The Marquis de *Florey* was arrived with the Barks and Gallies under his Command within sight of our Camp; and the Forces of *Hanover* were come within an hours march of it. The Hungarians belonging to the Garison of *Segradin* have lately passed the River *Tibysse*, and surprised a Party of Turks, of whom they killed 300 upon the place. General *Peterani* was by our last advice marching towards *Caransebes*; The Turks have put a Convoy of Provisions into *Temeswar*. Their Imperial Majesties are gone to the Castle of *Ebersdorf*, where they intend to pass some time.

*Hydelberg*, Sept. 12. The Confederat Army Commanded by the Landtgrave of *Hesse* and the Margrave of *Barach*, continues encamped at *Munnenheim*. A great many Peasants are at work on the Retrenchments that are making to cover our Bridge over the *Rhine* at *Blankheim*; and above 6000 are Summoned in with Shovels and Pick-axes out of the Neighbouring Districts to refortifie the Town of *Old Manheim*, where they intend to keepe a strong Garison this Winter to secure that Pass over the *Rhine*. The French Army Commanded by the Marschal de *Lorge* lies at present at *Ocheln*, behind the River *Queich*, not far from *Gernshym*, between *Philipsburg* and *Fort Louis*; and we hear that their Bridge of Boats which was at *Philipsburg* is removed higher up. On the 8th a Party of Hussars brought into our Camp divers French Prisoners.

*Cologne*.

*Cologne, Septemb. 16.* The Troops of *Neubourg* and *Cologne* lie still near *Malmédy*; from whence a Detachment of 2000 Horse and 1800 Foot, making 12 Squadrons, and 3 Battalions, with 6 pieces of Cannon, was sent on the 9th instant, under the Command of Major-General *Weix*, and the Count *de Velen*, to attack the *Marquis de Harcourt*, who was encamped with 5 Battalions and 24 Squadrons near *Alsdorf*. Our Horse being come in fight of the Enemy, immediately attackt them without staying for the Foot, and at last forced them to give way; But the French making use of their Cannon, it put our Horse into some disorder, and obliged them to retire; The Count *de Velen*, with two Captains, were taken Prisoners, and in all our loss was about 150 Men; What the Enemies was we cannot yet learn. The Confederate Army on the *Upper Rhine* is still encamped at *Mammenheim* to cover the Workmen that are employed in casting up several Remains to secure their Bridge, but they are presently to march towards *Kaullas*. The *Marquis de Velen* with the Forces he had under his Command about *Strasbourg*, joined the *Mareschal de Lorge*, who has now pass'd his Camp behind the River *Quick* to defend that Pass; His last that he has received from Orders to send Detachments towards *Lionan* & *Dauphin*.

*Paris, Septemb. 15.* The Letters from *Grenoble* of the 9th instant, say, That the Duke of *Savoy* was as well as one could be in his Condition, the Small-Pox being come out with all the good Symptoms that could be wish'd; The main Body of his Troops continued about *Gap*; the rest being sent out to raise Contributions, and a Detachment march'd towards *Siferon*, into which place the French have put a Garrison of the Soldiers taken out of their Gallies. The principal Inhabitants of *Gap* being retired to *Grenoble*, they have been Summoned by the Duke of *Savoy's* Officers to send Deputies to Treat about their Contributions, in default whereof they threaten to burn the Town. They continue to Fortifie *Grenoble*, and design to make 5 new Bastions there.

*From His Majesty's Camp at Grammen, Sept. 8. O. S.* The Duke of *Leinster* march'd yesterday from *Furres* to *Dixmuyde*, to secure that likewise for a Winter-Quarter. This Afternoon about a quarter past Two, there happened an Earthquake, which lasted near a Minute, and was very sensible to the whole Camp. The King was then at Dinner in an old decayed House, which shaking very much, and every one appending it was ready to fall, His Majesty was prevailed with to rise from Table to go out of the House; but the surprize was soon over. The Duke of *Luxemburg* continues about *Courtray* and Fortifies that place.

*Hague, Sept. 9. O. S.* The last Letters from *Dauphine* tell us, That the Duke of *Savoy* was in a very hopeful way of Recovery, and that the Dutchess was come to *Ambrun* to see him. They write from *Leige*, That the *Brandenburg* Forces were still encamped about *Huy*. Yesterday about two in the Afternoon was felt an Earthquake in most places of this Province.

*Kiffale, Sept. 5.* On the 3d instant arriv'd here the *Kempforn* of *London*, of 800 Tuns, 104 Men, and 50 Guns, *Rival* Pye Commander, richly laden from the *East-Indies*. Also the *Richard* and *John* of *Bristol*, of 350 Tuns, and 20 Guns, *John Jones* Commander; and the *Geowles* of *London*, the two latter from *Barbadoes*. This day came in the Exchange *Pink* of *Poole*, with Fish from *Newfoundland*.

*Plymouth, Sept. 8.* On Tuesday last came in here a Dutch Captor of 26 Guns, with a Prize of about 50 Tuns, laden with Cordage and Planks, being bound to *Kochesfort*; She was taken on the French Coast. On Wednesday came in the Spanish Expedition in 10 days from the *Groyne*; On Monday last about 30 Leagues to the Westward of the *Seynes*, they met a French Privateer of 28 Guns, and

they fought at some distance for several hours, but at last the French bore away.

*Plymouth, Sept. 4.* The Wind being yesterday fresh at East, the Fleet of Dutch Merchantmen in this Port bound to *St. Tubas*, *Cadix*, and other Places, set Sail, but the Wind changing and blowing ever since very hard at W. S. W. they came this Morning into *Catwaker* again; but one of them in Ballast of about 300 Tuns, bound for *Lisbon*, was driven against the Rocks under the Royal Citadel, and immediately broke in pieces, but her Men were all saved.
