Turin, Sept. 2. give an account, That after the taking of Ambrun, feveral Conferences of War were held there, and in pursuance of the Resolutions taken in them, the Marquis de Leganez, Governor of Milan, marched back to Guillestre with part of the Spanish Forces, and a Detachement of 3000 Men out of the other Troops, to maintain a Communication between those two places, and to observe Monfieur Catinat who was posted near Briancen; and on the 27th of the last Month his Royal Highness decamped with the rest of the Army from Ambrun, and marched to Savines, where the Enemy had lodged some of their Troops to guard the Bridge over the Durance, at the end of which they had likewise cast up a Redoubt, the better to secure it; but upon the approach of our Forces they a-bandoned that Post, and our Men possessed themselves of it. Here his Royal Highness found himfelf Indisposed; however, on the 29th he contimued his march to Gap, into which place he entred the same day without any opposition, most of the Inhabitants being fled to Grenoble; but his Illness encreasing, and turning to the Small-Pox, he was brought back to Ambrun, which has very much troubled the Court here. Fraice, Sept. 5. We have had no News this Weck from our Army before Canea. The Tripoli's have lately taken feveral finall Vessels on the Coast of Caisbria, as also a Genoue's Soip broad home from this place. The Count de Rabenac, the French Envoy, does very carnestly solicite the Princes of I alr, to whom he is employed to enter into a League for securing their Territories from Winter-Contress, but hitherto he has had but little success in this Negotiation.

Vicana, Sept. 7. The Letters of the 2d instant from the Imperial Army, which was then encamped a Leagues beyond Valkomar, consirm the News of the Radzians having taken the Treasure of the Turks, designed for the Service of this Campagne, which they have brought into our Camp; The Turkish Horse that was sent in pursuit of them retiring in great hast and disorder upon the advice they received that a Body of Germans was advancing towards them; The Money now taken by the Radziens is all in Ducats, and amounts to a Million and half. Our Army was to decamp on the third, and to continue their march towards the Save. The Marquis de Floury was arrived with the Barks and Gailies under his Command within sight of our Camp; and the Forces of Hannier were come within an hours much of it. The Hung rians belonging to the Garison of Segedin have lately passed the River Toyssi, and surprised a Party of Turks, of whom they killed 300 upon the place. General Viterani was by our last advice marching towards Caransfebes; The Turks have put a Convoy of Provisions into Temeswer. Their Imperial Majesties are gone to the Casile of Ebersdorf, where they intend to pass some time.
