The KING has been pleased to give directions for the appointment of Walter John Napier, Esquire, D.C.L., Barrister-at-Law, to be Attorney-General of the Straits Settlements.

The KING has been pleased to grant unto Charles Edward Harris, of West Court, in the parish of Finchampstead and county of Berks,

of Sheldons, in the parish of Newnham, and of Borough Court, in the parish of Odiham, both in the county of Southampton, Esquire, in the Commission of the Peace for the said county of Southampton, Commissioner of Taxes for the Basingstoke Division of the same, and Barrister-at-Law of the Society of the Inner Temple, His Royal licence and authority that he may, in compliance with a clause contained in an Indenture dated the fourth day of December, 1885, take and henceforth use and bear the surname of St. John in addition to and after that of Harris, that he may bear the arms of St. John quarterly with those of his own family, and that such surname and arms may in like manner be taken, borne, and used by his issue, the said arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms and recorded in the College of Arms, otherwise the said Royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect.

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in His Majesty's said College of Arms.
